We exceedingly regret to see that a most serious difficulty has arisen between the President and some of the leaders of the great Republican party, on the question of re-construction. Contrary to the expectations of all his friends, President Johnson vetoed the Freedmen's Bereau bill. Hence followed violent attacks upon him in the House and in the Senate. The Examiner says:

In the Senate, the Message accompanying the veto was received in profound silence until at the last word, a storm of hisses and cheers came from the galleries, which were at once cleared. No vote was taken that day, but at a subsequent day, after three speeches against the wete, the vote was taken to pass the bill over the President, and failed by 80 for, to 18 against. But the best that can be said of it is that it was in exceedingly bad taste for the President of the United States to condescend to personalities, pretend to fear assassination from men who may be opposed to him politically. It is degrading to the office which he holds.

The position which he has assumed, has subjected him to the most terrific maledictions from those who not long since lauded him to the skies.
