The deputation appointed at this meeting waited on Earl Russell, on fuesday, at his official residence, and was received with courtesy. Earl Russell was not surprised at the deep and widespread concern which the news from Jamaica had awakened, or insensible to the urgent necessity of enquiry into the circumstances under which so many of our fellow subjects have been slaughtered. The result of the interview was to impress the deputation with Earl Russell's anxious desire that justice shall be vindicated. This is as it ought to be. Liverpool Leeds, Birmingham, Bradford and other leading towns are expected to follow. We will have more about

Governor Eyre of Jamacia has been suspended rom his functions, pending an official inquiry. Sir Henry Storks is appointed temporarily in his place. Storks sails for Jamacia Dec. 18th. Times says Eyre's position will be that of Governor on leave, Morning Post thinks Eyre's suspension may have a bad effect on negroes.

S.r Henry Storks, Sir Edmund Head and Mr. Chas. Livingstone are understood to be the Commission of Inquiry for Jamacia.

Sir H. Stork, in additions to his functions as Governor of Jamaica, will be President of Commission of Inquiry. Uther members of Commission hot vet announced.

At Fenian trials on 12th, O'Donavan occupied the whole defence. He was insolent and sought to exhaust the Court, and, owing to a similar conviction six years ago, has been sentenced to hard servitude

A Fenian named Hallegan has been convicted and sentenced to seven years' penal servitude.

The trial of Captain McCafferty, the American Fenian is progressing rapidly.

Fenian Special Commission adjourned its sittings n Dublin on the 13th, and commenced proceedings in Cork on the following day.

A letter received in Liverpool confirms the statement that Stephens is safe in Paris.

Strong military precautious had been taken to naintain peace in Cirk.

Cork Herald alludes to recent departure of skilful pilots for America, as evidence of contemplated naval perations of Fenians.

It was reported that Governor of Richmond, Bride vell has absconded.

It was reported that France had given Queen of England six months to terminate extradition treaty, because of the strict formalities required before French off-nders can be given up.

The London Observer says Napoleon is apprehensive that Maximilian will follow his Empress to Europe, and has prevailed upon the Mexican Minister at Paris to proceed to Mexico to endeavor to persuade Maximilian from abdicating. He would sail on the 14th. The Observer thinks he will not be in time; that Maximilian will be in Europe before New Year's. Joint note of England and France, proposing certain terms for settlement of Chilian difficulties, was received at Madrid on the 9th. Result not known. SHANGHAL, Oct. 26th .- Burgoveine's death is likey to give trouble in Chinese Government. Reports now state he was drowned while in irons. American Consul declares that treaty with the United States has been violated.

It is stated that the health of the Queen of Spain s improving.

The King of Belguim was buried on Saturday. The new King has taken the oath of office.

The Message of President Johnson has been favourably received, and is regarded as friendly, and United States bonds improved after its reception.

Trial in London, in which plaintiff sought to recover his insurance on the laying of Atlantic Telegraph cable, has resulted in a verdict for plaintiff for otal loss. Case will be carried to a higher Court. American barque "Fanny Buck" ran into Dover and Calais Mail Steamer "Samphire ;" both were damaged-steamer very badly ; both were towed into Dover. Three of steamer's passengers were drowned.

BOSTON, Dec. 29. The fine steamer Commonwealth, of the Stoping ton and New York line, together with the depot buildings at Groton Junction, and thirty cars, many of them loaded with valuable freight, were destroyed by fire this morning shortly after the steamer arrived. The loss will reach nearly one million dollars. Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 29th .- We have news here from Morehead city of the loss of steamer " Constitution," from Savannah for New York. There were filty-four souls on board, and all were lost but fourteen of the crew.
