THE STATES IMPORTING FLOUR.

The Commercial Bulletin states that five or six cargoes of French flour are now on the way to this country-sent out, not because it is particularly needed here, but as a speculative adventure. This French flour, it is said-being of a grade corresponding to medium and good western-will readily command \$10 per barrel, or upwards, in the American market; at which figure it will net a profit of at least 5s. sterling, or about \$1,25 per bbl., to the importer, after paying the custom house duty of 20 per cent. gold premium, freight charges, etc.


