The speaker next proceeded to deal with financial calculations, and to show that the traffic on the road when built, arising from the transportation of lumber of all sorts, cattle and sheep, merchandize, oil, mails, and passengers, &c. &c., would produce an income that would more than cover the Company's outlay.

In reference to the probable receipts of the Railway from forest manufactures, included under the head of receipts, the lecturer referred to the fact that Captain Dunlop, before spoken of, had already established a factory near Salisbury for the manufacture of Spools, of which article he has already received an order for three hundred tons. This factory will employ 50 men, and the lecturer predicted that with the aid of Railways numerous factories of even greater pretensions would spring up rapidly on the different streams of Albert County. In conclusion Mr. Mellenry made a happy reference to the inexhaustible resources and undeveloped wealth of the County of Albert. Her soil and climate he described as the "best under the canopy of heaven," while in her mines and forests she was wealthy beyond probably the imagination of the most sanguine.
