If they persist in such folly, Texas cannot be admitted into the Union again. The amendment is our lowest offer, and also our highest offer. We can't accept any thing lower, and we have gone as high against ourselves as we can afford to go."

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 26.-Gen, Ortega, who claims to be the Constitutional President of Mexico in place of Juarez, arrived here to night from New York, and requests the papers to announce that he will leave in a lew days for Brownsville. Thence he will enter mifuge Comfits. Mexico with the object of re-establishing the Constitutional Government. When this is accomplished, he says he will send a Minister to Washington. His staff and a number of officers who have been awaiting him will accompany him to Mexico. Mazatlan letters say the French evacuated that port this month, and many families were leaving for San Francisco. has been arrested by the Imperialists for forwarding correspondence to Gen. Averez.
