PARDUBITZ, June 27, Evening.—Since 2 o'clock this morning a continuous fire of cavalry has been kept up by the Austrian and Prussian forces between Nenstadt and Hacleos in Bohemia. "The Prussians were repulsed near Shalitz when the cavalry took part in the action at six o'clock this evening. Prussians are beaten and are in full retreat, leaving their

dead and wounded on the field. Berlin, June 27, Evening.—The engagement which took place yesterday at Pacloc, to the East of Tuman, was of a very spirited character, and lasted until midnight; the troops engaged were the Prussian di-vision under Gen. Vanhorn, and the Prussian brigade under Gen. Patzchample. The Prussians lost a Colonel, Lieut. Colonel and Captain. The Prussian Chamber will probably be convoked for the 18th of

Ancona, June 27 .- Twelve men of war, comprising the Austrian fleet, appeared in sight of this port this morning, but are now leaving. The Italian squadron are preparing to follow and attack them.

BERLIN, June 27, noon. - Last night the army of the Elbe had a successful engagement near Tuman, taking 7 Austrian officers and 500 men prisoners. BERNE, June 27. - The Austrians have ventured to the first station upon the Stelvion. The Italians have

taken up a position near the Port de Diable.
PRAGUE, June 26.—The Prussians have destroyed the railroad bridge between Werdan and Grossnitz at Allenberg. The people resisted the Prussians. The King of Saxony left Prague to day.

FLORENCE, 26.—At the battle of Custozza the Aus-

trian forces numbered 60,000. The first army corps reserve on the heights to the left of Valeggio held in check the overwhelming number of Austrians be-fore which Gen. Crane had been forced to retire. Bixio's division and cavalry line protected the retreat of the army which was effected in good order. The Peameli division took in prisouers an entire battalion of Austrian chasseurs. The Italian cavalry had several engagements with the Austrians, who suffered heavy losses, and the 3rd army corps took about 1000 prisoners. The Italian losses are great, but those of the enemy are believed to be still more considerable. The Italian cavalry did not abandon their position until after the enemy had received reinforcements. Toward nightfall both the Italians and Austrians retired from their respective positions.

UNITED STATES.

Practical reconstruction is being rapidly effected of in the South. This is evident from the reports furnished concerning the transfer and improvements of Atlanta papers speak of extensive building enterpri-ses which are being prosecuted. Public structures are being erected or repaired, while real estate is improving. Cotton manufactories are being established, commerce is extending, and direct importations are increasing; new telegraph lines are opening, and new newspapers are starting, while many which were sus-pended are being revived. New York, July 9.

Steamer Cuba, from Havana, brings intelligence a revolt in Cuba.

About the 29th ult., information was sent by civil and military authorities of Porto Principe to the Capt. General at Havana, that in that place, as well as the neighbourhood, a spirit of revolt had been observed for some time past, and treasonable language was used openly in the public places. The authorities at Havana, however, paid no heed to the warning until news came that a portion of the population had broken out in open revolt and declared for the independence of Cuba, and separation from the Spanish

On the 1st inst., a military force, consisting of five companies, stationed at Port Principe, was sent against the insurgents to bring them to order. A fight ensued in which a Colonel was killed and three

officers mortally wounded. Three Companies of the Spanish soldiers went over to the Insurgents. The latter thus reinforced and numbering 7,000 men, proceeded to the mountain

region.

The moment this news was known at Havana, three steamers were dispatched with troops to the place of revolt; but before they were fairly on their way, which was on the 30th, the stirring intelligence arrived that four steamers, with 2,000 troops on board, had made their appearance near Necevitas, bearing the Chilian flag and effected a landing in the vicinity.

All the discontented thereupon proceeded to the place of rendesvouz, and it was believed the revolt had ramifications throughout the whole Island.

Among those who left Porto Principe were about 1,000 negroes who, it is asserted, were armed by

their owners to join the Insurgents. The whole affair was looked upon as a general revolution of the natives to free themselves from Spanish rule. Gold 152.


