THE CROPS The late warm weather and refreshing rains have given a remarkable impetus to vegetation generally. Grass, grain and vegetables of all kinds are exceedingly promising; and contrary to the recent forebodings of the agricultural districts, there is now every reason to hope for a bounteous barvest.

ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

It will be seen by the news below, that the great struggle in Central Europe has really commenced. How long it will continue, where it will end, or what will be the result, the Omniscent only knows. Let us all pray in faith, that as in 1848, when the war tempest passed over the nations now meeting in deadly conflict, our own beloved England may be preserved from the terrible culumaties just opening up on the sisterhood of neighbouring kingdoms.

BOSTON, July 2. City of Bremen has arrived, with dates to the 19th. In the House of Commons the debate on the Reform Bill continued.

The House divided on Lord Dunkellin's amendment, substituting rateable value for the clear yearly value. The amendment was carried against the Gov-

ernment by 11 votes, viz. : 315 ayes; 305 noes. Mr. Gladstone put himself into communication with the Queen at Balmoral, and the House adjourned till Monday.

ARRIVAL OF THE "CUBA." HALIFAX, July 2, 1866.

"Cuba," Stone, left Liverpool 4 P. M., June 28rd. Queenstowu 24th, arrived at Halifax at 2 P. M., 2nd July. She has 28 Halifax, and 117 Boston passengers. "Persia" intercepted Crookhaven at 2 P. M., and

reached Liverpool on the afternoon of the 23rd. CONTINENTAL WAR.

No Military news of any importance yet received. Preparations for the great struggle continue night and day; but the main armies have not yet met. It is stated that the Union States, whose levies are congregated at Frankfort, much discouraged at the aspect of affairs; and greatly disposed to complain that Austria thrust them into danger before she was able to protect them. It is rumored that Bavaria hesitates at present to take active part in the Campaign on the ground that Austria is not ready. The Pall Mall Gazette says there is a growing

belief that Austria resolved to concentrate all her strength in effort to secure supremacy in Germany, and after such crossing of swords as will satisfy her Honor, she will surrender Venice if Italians are willing to come to amicable understanding.

The Times speaking of apparent delay on the part of Austria, observes Austrians no doubt had some reason for apparent inactivity to be successful at the beginning of the campaign.

Daily News thinks inactivity been imposed under

sagacious Council. Prussian troops entered Austrian territory near Odenburg in Upper Silesia on the night of the 21st.

Prussians continued to fortify themselves at Dresden. Vienna papers assert that Saxon town Zeittan had been destroyed by Prussians, in consequence of the refusal of inhabitants to pay war contributions. Federal Council of Switzerland have been officially informed that hostilities with Italy commenced on

Austrians declared Venice and Trieste in state of siege. Austrian outposts at Afraiso were attacked by Italian volunteers on 22nd. Several shots exchanged.
Officially denied at Berlin that Prussia ordered

conscriptions in countries they have entered. Ministerial Crisis .- Times states that Queen will not return from Scotland till morning of 26th; therefore expected that explanation cannot be given to Parliament until that day. Extensively believed that Queen has given Ministers option of dissolution of Parliament.

The Times thinks a dissolution possible, but improbable; the Star thinks prospect of a dissolution clear, believes the Queen has not the slightest objection. Public meetings in large towns are being held in support of Government and reform.

UNITED STATES.

BOSTON, July 3.

Senator Lane, of the U. S. Senate, from Kansas, shot himself through the heart last night. He died this morning. He has been ill for some time. A telegram from the Rio Grande, dated June 24. has the following important Mexican news:

A battle between Eacobodo and Mejia on the 16th ult., near Camargo, resulted in the rout of the latter. and capture of a train of merchandize. Bagdad was abandoned by the Imperialists on the night of the 18th.

The city of Matamoras capitulated on the 23d to Commissioners appointed by Carovaja-Gen. Mejia, with the Imperial troops, embarking between the hours of 3 and 4 P. M., under the protection of the U. S. flag.

The most liberal terms were granted to the Impeialists. The city was given up without bloodshed, pillage or plunder, and is now under the command of sen. Jose De La Garcia.

In the House of Representatives yesterday, Mr. Banks introduced a Bill establishing conditions for the admission of the States of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Canada East and Canada West, and for the organization of Territorial Governments for Newoundland, Prince Edward Island and Colombia, Read twice and referred to the Committee of Foreign Gold 1531.
