ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

PENIANISM IN CONFUSION. The wise, prompt and energetic action of the British Government in relation to unhappy Ireland has shaken, as with a mighty earthquake, the whole Fenian conspiracy to its deepest foundations. This action at the same time is opening the secret ramifications of this dark plot to an extent that is truly appalling. The Christian World says seizures contique to be made in Ireland of men charged with being concerned in the Fenian conspiracy, including a number more soldiers who had deserted from their regiments in England. Pikes and gunpowder in conregiments in England. Pikes and gunpowder in considerable quantities have also been discovered and taken by the officers of the Government. Every loval subject as well in Ireland as England, must loyal subject, as well in Ireland as England, must hope that the miserable rebellion is in a fair way of

being speedily put down. An entire Fenian Council, comprising a couple of Head Centres, was arrested at one blow the other evening in the large room of a public-house in one of the back streets in Dublin. The police entered the shed, as many of the eighteen conspirators were armed with seven-chambered revolvers (loaded and capped) of the newest and most efficient pattern. Great crowds gathered in the streets outside when the rumor spread, and a company of infantry were needful to guard the arrested and arresters to the gaol. Considerable uneasiness is felt at the number of soldiers who are found to be tainted with the sedition. Courts-martial are sitting at Dublin, and been the great agent in seducing soldiers. Fenian agents invite them "to liquor," and put an enemy into their mouths to steal away brains, and common sense, and common honesty. The eighteen arrested in council (as above stated) comprised twelve noncommissioned officers and privates. "Military Fenianism is a pothouse plant fed on whisky and beer," says a southern local paper, which also advocates strongly the garrisoning of Ireland chiefly with Eng-

lish and Scotch militie. "Bonds of the Irish Repub-

lic" are sometime found on the dupes, "payable in reality at Spike Island, Mountjoy, and Pentonville prisons; and if speculators desire to know whether they are a safe or pleasant investment, let them inquire of the present wearers, who would be willing to transfer them on easy terms!" Among the prisoners arrested under the Act for Suspension of Hubeas Corpus have been discovered many military deserters; it is hoped they are Fenians who enlisted for the nefarious purpose of corrupting regiments, rather than soldiers once loyal, who have been successfully so corrupted. They gave false names at first, and it was only on examination by orderly officers and sergeantsmajor acquainted with their appearance that their real character was discovered. A drilling party of Fenians, under command of a soldier of the 17th. were surprised at their amusement fully armed. Considering the state of the country, it is a wonderful sign of the strength of Government and the confidence reposed in it by the moneyed classes, that all sorts of Irish securities have scarcely wavered. Railway shares. Irish bank, mines, steam, canals, seem unmoved by the shock of Fenian disquiet, and support former rates and pay former dividends with firmness. This is surely a most hopeful symptom.

The proposition was immediately revived by a motion to reconsider, in order to enable Mr. Doolittle to offer a substitute pasing political power on the number of legal voters in the respective States.
