THE CATTLE PLAGUE.—The cattle plague is extending at an increasing ratio. For the week ending the 30th Dec., the number of cases reported was 7.6 93 being 1,337 in excess of the preceding week, whilst for the week ending Jan. 6th the number of cases was 9,120, showing an increase of 1,427 on the previous week. The greatest increase was in Scotand and Yorkshire, the number of cases for the former being 2,649 against 1,975, and for the latter 2,028 against 1,446. The Metropolitan Police District showed a slight increase, and there was also an increase in the South-Eastern, Eastern, West Midland, and North-Western counties; and Monatouthshire and North Midland, and Northern counties. The total number of cases attacked was 82,057, of which 14,519 had been killed, 47,192 had died, and 8,268 had recovered. SURCEON.

### ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

The Liberals of Britain are calling upon Earl Russel loudly for a Reform Bill that shall elevate the working classes, and give them a voice in the government of the country. Mr Bright is lifting up his voice like a trumpet in advocacy of Reform measures. He says there are three great steps of Parliamentary reform: extension of the suffrage, protection to the voter, and fairer distribution of seats. At present, one whole class-that, which works for wages-is excluded from direct representation; that class can. therefore, feel no interest in protecting the votes of other classes, or in distributing the representation more equally among them. Admit the working men to a fair share in the representation, and they will back our demand for the other two objects. Proceed The Liberal members for the pocket boroughs might not feel it honourable towards their constituencies to vote for their extinction, but they night vote for a simple extension of the suffrage. Probably Mr. Bright calculates correctly, though he does it so publicly. The Tories to a man will vote against a Reform Bill as a whole or in detail, whether it be limited to the franchise, or include schedules A. B, and C. The doubtful Liberal votes are all that could be retained by any difference of Reform policy: and no respectable Liberal could, on any pretext, refuse to vote for a fair extension of the franchise. He could not excuse himself from doing justice, by anti-

cipating its leading to additional acts of justice.

It seems as if Mr. Bright had some knowledge of weakness and vacillation in the ministerial counsels. He appears to fear that Lord Russell is solicited to advance the standards of suffrage qualification, and propose £7 or £8 for boroughs, £15 or £20 for counties. He earnestly warns the Government against any such weakness, and with good reason, for a Bill which had nothing but moderation—concession, rather-for its character, and no feature of boldness. would be passed, or more probably dismissed, with contempt, and only make work for future agitation. Ii the Bill be restricted to the Franchise, it ought on that point to be worthy of a boldly wise statesman.

BISHOP COLENSO

has arrived in his diocese. The churchwardens waited on him, and presented their protest against his preaching in the Cathedral. He declared his intention of doing so. It became known that they intended forcibly to prevent him. An affidavit of these in-tentions was made on behalf of the Bishop in the Supreme Court, which interdicted them from obstructing him. They went as far as they dare, however, keeping him waiting at the locked gates, while they read the protest, a great crowd of persons having naturally collected. Two of the High Church clergy kept their places, kneeling with their backs to the people, at the communion table. The Bishop then went through the service, preaching afterwards from Philippians i. 8-10. In the evening the churchwardens contrived not to have the church lighted in time. They locked the harmonium, and the Bishop had to set the time himself, in which the congregation joined.

JAMAICA AFFAIRS.

The amended Religious Worship Bill, adopted by the Jamaica Assembly, appears to be scarcely less objectionable than its withdrawn predecessor— tyrannical in its provisions, and attended with severe panalities. It may be hoped that such legislation will never come into operation. We are glad to see that the Society of Friends have resolved to send a deputation to Jamaica to secure an independent report of the real cause of the late disturbances, and of the social condition of the people. Still further, the committee formed in London to aid in bringing to ight the truth about the Morant Bay rising have obained the legal opinion of two eminent Counsel, Mr. Edward James and Mr. Fitz-James Stephen, on the onduct of the authorities so far as they stand revealed by their own documents to the Government, and it is entirely in favour of those who urge that the law even of Jamaica has been grievously violated by the

men charged to maintain it.

Mr. Pringle, formerly a well-known stipendiary magistrate in Jamaica, has published a letter on the flogging of females in the late disturbances in that island. It will surely rouse the blood of every Englishman,—of all the countrymen of those true sons of their country who, at Barclay's Brewery, rewarded Haynau, the woman-flogger, according to his deeds. From Mr. Pringle's statement, it would seem that the old indecencies and barbarities of slavery towards females survive in the penal practices of the island authorities. We had descriptions of the treatment of wemen then, which probably, more than anything else, convinced the English public of the utterly demoralising effects of slavery on the masters. The sex of sufferers was no more regarded than if they had no sentiments to be outraged more than those of the planters' cattle. It seems as if freedom had little bettered this brutal estimate of the feelings of black females. "An English-woman," in The Star this morning, suggests that all women should petition for he punishment of the recent offenders, and for egislative prohibition of such treatment of females broughout the Queen's dominions.


