of a most serious character; and they also felt that the body to settle the route was the Confed-erate Legislature and the men who were responerate Legislature and the men who were respon-sible to the people of the whole Dominion, subject to the approval of Her Majesty's principal Secre-tary of State for the Colonies. For himself he said he should—if he had anything to say in the matter—approach the discussion of the route in as impartial a proach the discussion of the route in as impartial a spirit as possible, and whether the decision was favora-ble or otherwise, he should be prepared to submit. His opinions were well known, but he trusted that he could confidently appeal to the public sentiment of the Western and Southern sections of the Province whether he had not in all cases as a public man sup-ported those measures which were for their welfare with which he had anything to do.

### NOVA SCOTIA.

The Legislative Session closed on Tuesday of last week. His Excellency General Williams, in his closing speech, expressed his deep gratification with the action of both branches on the question of union.

We learn from the Pictou Standard, " that certain We learn from the Pictou Standard, "that certain parties in Toronto have made arrangements to estab-lish steam communication between Toronto, Canada West, and Pictou. The steamer "Her Majesty' will run during the present season of navigation be-tween Toronto and this port, calling at all the lake and river ports as far as Quebec; she will call at Gaspe, Pierce, Chatham, Newcastle, Richibucto, Shediac, Charlottetown, and Pictou. "Her Majesty' is a steamer of about six hundred tons measurement She was to leave Toronto on her first trip about the fifth of May. Mr. Benner, the agent of the company, states that an extensive trade is anticipated, while if realized, will lead to the establishment of a weekly line of steamers on the line, carrying downwards assorted cargoes of goods suited to the markets on the route, and carrying a return cargo of coal from

Hon. Joseph Howe, on his return from England, met with a cordial reception from his friends. He entertained them with a two hours speech in Mason Hall, in which, according to the Unionist, he declared his determination to oppose Tupper and Archibald tooth and nail, - " preferring Washington to Ottawa." The political tide is rising rapidly in our native Province. The press on both sides calls loudly for determined and earnest action. Several of the leading towns, Halifax and Colchester, have held mass meetings, and nominated their candidates for Ottawa, and for the local legislature. The whole Province will be moved from centre to circumference, to take part in the approaching contest.

MONTREAL, May 18. Two vessels have arrived here from Marseilles; one made the trip in 39 days. Agricultural operations are very backward and some time must elapse before operations the low lands can be commenced, owing to the floods.

# ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

Thanks to a gracious providence, through the successful influence of England's Queen and ministry, the war tide, which threatened, a few weeks ago to deluge Europe with blood, has been checked and indications of peace are bright with promise. God forbid that Victoria's reign should ever again be stained with human gore. Our heart longs for the diffusion and preservation of universal peace. We learn from the cable telegrams that on the 9th inst., the Peace Conference held a second session to day. The followiog basis for the deliberations of the conference was agreed upon.

First. The territory of Luxemburg is to remain in possession of the King of Holland as Grand Duke of Luxemburg. Second. The neutralization of the Grand Duchy is

to be guaranteed by all the European powers
