in the columns of such papers as the New York Herald &c., as to the present treatment of Ireland by Engand are in many instances, false from beginning to end The utter repudiation of Fenianism by nine-tenths the Irish people, is the best answer to these slanders. Ireland is advancing; and by the cordial union which now happily exists between the Liberals of Great Britain and Ireland led by the illustrious Gladstone and Bright, must advance yet more rapidly in the path of social amelioration. Fifty of the Feeians recently arrested on the Liverpool and Holyhead steamers were discharged to-day on condition that they would immediately depart. Nearly all of them went back by steamers this evening.

On the Continent there is peace, but uneasiness in many quarters. The rebellion in Crete is virtually extinguished, though the embers still smoulder. The christian provinces of Turkey in Europe are very restless. The Pacha of Egypt is putting forward new demands upon the Sultan at Constantinople which will virtually make Egypt an independent kingdom. Turkey is clearly falling to pieces.

SWIND OF PRUSSIA ORGANIZING.

The same writer says :-

Prussia is quietly organizing her recently acquired territory, and grows every day in political power. Southern and Roman Catholic Germany is moving in the direction of a closer alliance with Prussia. Bavaria, which fought on the side of Austria in the late war, now declares that in case of a war between Prussia and Austria, she would place her army at the disposal of Prussia. This virtually adds five millions more to the population of Prussia, above and beyond what she gained by the last treaty. Of the five millions of Bavarians, about three and a half millions are Romanists. Thus Germany, Protestant and Popish, North and South, is gradually drawing closer to Prussia, and before long all Germany, except the eight millions of Austrians, will be "Prus-

Count Bismarck has for some days been unwell and is now confined to his room. 
