#### shore. In the bottom of the sleigh were found quantity of silk gloves, and other articles, which, it is supposed, the deceased intended to smuggle over the river.

By a decision of the Court of Chancery, which finally disposes of a long pending law suit, Mr. Hudson, the forgotten railway king, will be restored to a position of comparative wealth.

Mr. Gladstone has been entertained at dinner by the Political Economy Society in Paris. He also dined with the Emperor, and was the object of his highest consideration. Mr. Gladstone attributed commercial reforms chiefly to the Emperor recent and Mr. Cobden, and took very little credit to himself. Ilis public speeches in Paris were in English, in Florence in "elegant Italian." Mr. Gladstone is apparently the "coming man." We trust he will be conservative as well as progressive.

MR. GEO. PEABODY'S LATEST DONATION. - This gen tleman may be justly designated the most benveolent man of the age. In addition to the large amounts given by him to provide for the poor of London, and

to advance educational institutions in his own country, he has recently donated upwards of two millions of dollars to educate the young of the more destitute portions of the South-western States. He directs "that the benefits intended shall be distributed amongst the entire population, without other distinction than their needs and the opportunities of usefulness among them."

# ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

LONDON, Feb. 14 .- The British Government will assume the legal expense of the defence of Governor Eyre of Jamaica, whose trial is now progressing VALENTIA, IRELAND, Feb. 15 .- The telegraph wires

ceased working between Valentia and Killarney at half-past 7 o'clock last night, and are still down. Two long despatches which were sent through the

cable to day, were received by mail from Killarney. A telegraph despatch from Heart's Content, dated Feb. 15th, 9 A. M., says: No further particulars of the troubles in Ireland have been received from Valentia

London, Feb. 14 .- The Government denies the spread story of the landing of ship loads of Fenians at Valentia and in the Shannon. That there has been a serious revolt at and near Killarney is admitted. The telegraph wires near Valentia have been cut and destroyed for a long distance and in all directions. Riot and pillage are the order of the day, and several establishments have been sacked. A Coast Guard policeman has been killed.

LONDON, Feb. 15 .- About 800 Fenians under the command of Col. O'Connor, have retreated to the hills laying about Killarney, County Kerry. The British Government posted troops under the command of Col. Horsford at Mallow Junction, in Cork County, commanding the hill district. The excitement in the neighborhood is intense, and many people living in those Counties are precipitately leavnig. LONDON, Feb. 16. - Telegraph wires in the insurrec-

tionary districts of Ireland have been cut, and meagre news is received from that quarter. It is suppressed by the authorities for prudential reasons. A large Fenian party has been surrounded by national troops in Loomis woods. The chances for success look exceedingly small. The band of 800 who retreated to the hills near Killarney, is still at large. The uprising is thus far confined to Kerry and Cork Counties, and it is not believed that trouble will spread further. The Government stated to Parliament today that Horsford's force was altogether too small to follow armed bands of Fenians into Loomis woods, but the Colonel had hopes of surrounding the insurgents and preventing their escape. The authorities in Ireland have assured the British Government that the present rising is totally stopped.

DUBLIN, Feb. 17 .- The outbreak at K llarney has come to an end, and the bands of insurgents have disappeared. One hundred and forty Fenians have been arrested in this city, and are now in jail.

Rentes in consequence recovered from their recent depression, and are advancing. MADRID, Feb. 17.-Spain is about to augment her

fleet in the West Indies. LONDON, Feb. 17.-It is now considered certain that the determined resistance of the Cretans and the spirit of concession, recently shown by the Turkish Government, will result in the complete independence of the Island of Candia.

LONDON, Feb. 18 .- Cause of Fenian outbreak in the South of Ireland is yet buried in obscurity. Some

say it was caused by the arrest of an American officer, Capt. Moriarty, while others say his prompt. arrest prevented a general rising of the Irish. The British Government had news of the affair early on 12th. The Fenian plan was to attack Killarney, capture that place, and then march to Cork; but the immediate despatch of troops from Cork to Killarney by Gen. Bates, and the celerity of Col. Horsford's movements, defeated the whole plot and caused insurgent bands to disperse. A Fenian horse courier was caught by the troops, a couple of swords picked up, but no men have been captured. O'Connor and his staff are said to have reached Fenian vessels off Dingle Bay. Thirty-four suspected persons were arrested in Dublin yesterday, and after examination, were detained in custody. Head Centre Murphy, and Colonels Lawler, Healy and Johnson have been arrested at Limerick, and important papers were found upon their persons and in their lodgings.

Alarm caused by these events is about over, and

excitement rapidly subsiding. LONDON, Feb. 18.—An upper servant in the house-hold of the Earl of Kenmare had received two anonymous notes, stating that the rising was planned in Killarney, and that the leader would reach Killarney that night. Constables were immediately sent to intercept him. They met a waggon, on which they found Moriarty, whom they took into custody, and upon searching his person found letters that confirmed the assertions in the anonymous notes. A courier named Duggan was sent to Caterciveen to warn the police. A party of rebels caught him while on his way, and demanded his despatches, which he refused to give up, and attempted to escape; they fired upon him, and he was badly hurt. As far as is known, he

is the only person who has been hurt. A despatch from Madrid states that the King Consort has been exiled from Spain on a charge of plotting for the Regency of the Kingdom.


