According to reports just published, from January to July of the present year no less than 63,870 cases of cholera occurred in Italy, of which 82,074, or more than half, proved fatal.

Rome, Sept. 13.—Pope Pius has resolved to call together a general Council of the Roman Catholic Church; he has named a congregation of seven Cardinals, to whom he has entrusted the duty of arranging the preliminaries for the meeting of the Council.

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 13.—The United States steamer Franklin has arrived from Stockholm and is anchored in this harbor. The Americans are cordially greeted by the people.

VIENNA, Sept. 13.—The financial relations between Austria and Hungary have been satisfactorily adjusted.

FLORIANO, Sept. 13.—The Italian Government threatens to commence legal proceedings against Garibaldi if he persists in his preparations for a hostile attack upon Rome.

CORINTHOPOLIS, Sept. 14.—A firman from the Sublime Porte granting a general amnesty to the Greek insurgents in the island of Candia, has just been officially promulgated. The Turkish Government has concluded not to send to Candia as was proposed a mixed commission consisting of Ottoman and Greek members to inquire into and report upon the grievances of the Cretans.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—The ship Taeping has arrived at her dock, and has thus won the honor of being the first ship of the China fleet with new tea. Sixteen ships came substantially from China. Consols and five-twentieth unchanged.

HAMPSHIRE, Sept. 15.—The fortifications of Strasburg are to be extended and strengthened.

TWO HOURS, Sept. 16.—Gardiner, arrested here for forgery, has been examined, and intelligence from him led to the seizure of many more counterfeit United States notes.

LAWYERS, Sept. 16.—James Hewitt & Co. of this city, have suspended payment. The amount of liabilities has not yet been ascertained. The firm was largely engaged in the American trade.

PEACE, Sept. 16.—James Hind, one of the Fenian leaders who had been concealed in Ireland during the last outbreak, was traced to Hawih last week, and his arrest was quickly effected there to-day.

## UNITED STATES.

President Johnson is ruling with a high hand. The developments of the last fortnight, says the Tribune, at Washington and New Orleans demand a greater and more thoughtful consideration; that they seem to have generally received. Let us condense their most salient features into a few ideas, viz.:

1. The President informs Secretary Stanton that his resignation of the War Department would be acceptable.

2. Mr. Stanton replies that he considers it his duty to hold on.

3. Gen. Grant advises Mr. Stanton that the President has requested him [Grant] to take charge of the War Department, *pro tem.*, and that he has consented to do so.

4. Mr. Stanton responds that, such being the case, he gives WAY.

5. Gen. Grant is installed at the War office, he receives and passes an order from the President that Gen. Sheridan be deprived of the command at New Orleans, and that Gen. Thomas be sent there instead.

6. Gen. Thomas telegraphs that he is sick, and cannot go to New Orleans.

7. Gen. Hancock is to be sent instead.

8. Gen. Sickles is master of command in the Carolinas, and Gen. Canby sent down to replace him.

9. Gen. Pope, commanding in Georgia and Alabama, has warning to set his house in order, as he is to be suspended as soon as made to do so.

10. Col. Howard, chief of the Freedmen's Bureau, is to be succeeded directly by Gen. Gordon Granger, who is only a Colonel in the regular service, who got up the Johnson Soldiers' Convention at Cleveland last year, and who has ever since been revolving about the White House and attending to politics, though ordered to join his regiment, which is on duty in New York.

11. The National Intelligencer, whose editor is the President's confidential organist, calls for the resignation of the residue of the Cabinet, indicating that as the member whose place is most urgently wanted.

12. The Rebel and pro-Rebel element is electrified by these movements into a pernicious activity and confidence, and is attempting the Presidency to go ahead.

13. The election on which he seems to have entered.

GALVESTON, Sept. 13.

Misinform'd advice to the 4th inst. state that a proclamation has been promulgated ordering the election of Deputies to Congress and for President and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, on the 22nd of September. The district election will take place on the 6th, 7th and 8th. Congress meets November 20th; the President takes his seat on the first day of December, and the Chief Justice on the 1st of January.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.

Special correspondence from Rio Janeiro, to Aug. 8th, reports a disastrous result to the expedition of the allied forces, fitted out at San Paulo to march out the distant Province of Mato Grosso and sweep out the Paraguayan.

The expedition was obliged to retreat after advancing far into the Paraguayan territory. They were harassed for 20 days by the natives, and cholera also broke out, carrying off the principal officers and a large number of men.

The ill-fated army had not succeeded in making any material advance.

Navy, Sept. 17.

Advice from Mexico via Havanna to the 9th inst., and Vera Cruz 13th are received.

Admiral Tegethoff appeared at the Mexican War Office on the 4th, as the verbally authorised deputy from the relatives of the late Maximilian, to ask for the name of humanity the remains of the deceased Juarez having refused the request of Baron Magenta, and other influential persons, could not deliver the body of Tegethoff unless he presented the proper official documents from the relatives of the deceased, when such documents are shown he would permit the transportation of the body to Austria.

A Buenos Ayres letter mentions a rumor of intervention by England.

The allies were moving on the Paraguayan rear with 37,000 men.
