CITY OF MEXICO, Dec. 27th. An Imperial decree has been issued ordering a new enrolment of property to be taxed for the support of the Government, embracing every known description of property within the jurisdiction of the Empire The taxes are to be paid every other month of the year under penalty of compulsion and pay-ment of costs. Gen. Dorai commands the French forces at Puebla, where Maximilian was living in most private manner. The City Council welcome him in an address, praying for the prosperity of the Empire and the consolidation of the nation. Col. Bravo and three of his chiefs (Mexicans) have been shot by the Imperialists.


