to in committee. A messenger from the Legislative Council reported the following bills agreed to :- A bill to establish County Courts; a bill to incorporate the President and Directors of the Eastern Bank in the County of Westmorland; a bill to incorporate the Merchants' Bank of New Brunswick; a bill to amend the law relating to Grammar, Superior and Parish Schools, and a bill relating to Trade Marks; also the bill to provide for the inspection of Petroleum and Coal Oil, with certain amendments; a bill to provide for the widening of Cross street passed with an amendment.
