## ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

The Abyssinian monster Theodore, whose kingdom is to be shaken by the thunders of British cannon, pursuing a course at the present time towards his own subjects which indicates the most savage temper imaginable. It seems that he is in the midst of a most determined insurrection. Numbers of his own subjects have revolted, and large sections of the country have fallen into the hands of the rebels, and the war rages with terrific fury. Neither side shows a particle of fury. In the king's camp, butchery of the most savage type goes forward continually. The whole country between Detra Tabor and the Lakes, formerly thickly populated, has been laid waste, and men, women and children, who could not effect their escape, have been ruthlessly murdered. It is said that a body of over two thousand men, who attempted to decamp in August last, were slaughtered like so many sheep, and nearly two hundred chiefs were left to die of starvation after suffering the mutilation of their hands and feet. The cruel indignities inflicted upon the women are too horrible to mention Such is the character of the people that England has undertaken to subdue. If British soldiers fall into their hands, they will be subjected to the most fear-ful tortures. It may be that Jehovah has purposes of love to accomplish towards this savage nation, and that England is to prepare the way in this case, as she has done in many others, for the proclamation of the Gospel of the grace of God, and for the establishment of Christian missions in benighted Abyssinia. Let us pray that such may be the result of the war ilod Topenian Sympathy looded toit

is constantly exhibiting itself in the large cities and towns of England in a way that is most troubleson if not really alarming. The sentence of death passed upon the Manchester Fenians, Allen, Gould, Larkin, Maguire and Shore, found guilty of the murder of policeman Brett, has given rise to sympathetic meetings and processions in London, and in other large places. All that Government has yet done fails to reach the root of this tramendous evil. The numerous demonstrations conclusively show that Fenianism, as a sentiment, has incorporated itself with the sympathics and passions of large masses of the Irish people, and that righteons legislation or justice to Ireland alone can root it out. A cable despatch of the 22d, says:

In the House of Commons last night an effort was made to save the lives of the Manchester rioters. made to save the lives of the Manchester rioters. John Francis Macguire, member for the city of Cork, moved that the House interfere for a stay in the execution of the sentences, and meanwhile the points of law upon which he based his resolution be referred to the twelve highest judicial authorities in the realm.
