gland asking a repeal of the Union, and their representatives in Parliament are instructed to go to Ottawa with a protest against Confederation. All they ask is to be allowed to remain alone in their glory. If this be really the feeling of a large majority of the people, our plan would be to use no forcible measures to compel them to come into the Union. Try moral sussion to the full; and if that fail, let them remain in isolation, and let St. John, instead of Halifax, be made the great Depot of the Intercolonial Railway. Such an arrangement would double the size and com-merce of St. John in a few years. We have a splendid harbor for winter as well as summer shipping. A forced union cannot work satisfactorily. Let us have it peacefully or not at all.

### ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—The following despatch has been received from Florence, direct, dated to-night:—
It is reported that General Garibaldi has again escaped from Caprers, and that he left the Island on board an American ship.

The Garibaldians have appeared in the Western district between Rome and the sea. They have taken possession of the railway running between the city

of Rome and the sea port of Ostia, and torn up the rails, preventing all communication.

It is still believed here in Florence that the governments of Italy and France have a perfect understand-

ing with each other, and are really acting together in the treatment of the Roman question.

At a dinner party to Earl Derby at Manchester last evening, Derby defended the action of the Gov-erment on the Reform question, and replied to some of the attacks on the Reform Bill. Lord Stanley, Secretary of Foreign Affairs, spoke

of the disturbed condition of Europe, but declared that not withstanding the threatening conditions of affairs, he still entertained hopes that peace would

In reviewing the present relations of Great Britain with foreign powers he alluded to the controversy with the United States, regarding claims for indemnity arising out of the late war in that country. The controversy he said still remained open, but England had all along dealt with America in a friendly temper, and time is already soothing the irritation which might have arisen on either side of the At-

lantic.

London, Oct. 19th.—It is understood that arrangements are perfected between the Anglo Saxon Company and the Atlantic Company, whereby the present rates by Cable will be reduced fully 50 per cent.—

This reduction will go into effect November 15th. Last evening repeated efforts were made by the Fesians to burn the police station at Manchester, and thus release some of their comrades there consigned. The fire was, extinguished before any damage was

The Government is on the alert, and precaution are everywhere taken to guard against surprise.

On the other hand, dispatches originating in Rome flatly contradict these statements, and assert that Meinotte, with all his followers, has fled from the Papal dominions and abandoned the extension of Rome. doned the attempt on Rome.
