The navy estimates for the year 1867-8 were issued on Saturday morning. The sum required to be voted is $\pounds 10,926.253$, which is a net increase on he last vote of £491,518. The total force in the fleet and coastguard service to be voted this year is 67,300, being some sixty more than last year.

THE PUNISHMENT OF DEATH. - Two Bills on this subject have been introduced in the House of Commons by Mr. Secretary Walpole. The Bills embody the recommendations of the Royal Commission ap pointed to consider the subject. One relates to the punishment itself, and it classifies the offences for which death is now inflicted, substituting for that punishment, in certain cases, penal servitude, for a term not less than seven years. The other provides that the execution shall no longer take place in pub lic, but in private, within the walls of the gaol, in the presence of certain functionaries, and with certain formalities. With regard to the former, Mr. Bright, one of the commissioners, expressed his regret that the list of offences for which death was the penalty were not sull more limited by the bill, and Mr. Ewart, Mr. Gilpin, and Mr. Henley advocated the entire aboition of the punishment of death. The other bill requiring executions to be in private, seemed to meet with a general consent.

The South London Press informs us that the religious community of London is promised a novelty in the shape of " the smallest Methodist preacher in the world." This latest "sensation" is at present in the Peterborough circuit, where, we are told, he is ? laporing with extraordinary success," so much so that, "in some places where he has been engaged, the numbers have been more than doubled." The rev. entleman is about an inch taller than General Tom Thumb.


