at San Sebastian, but it is rumored that she will soon leave for Pau in the department of the lower Pyrenees. The Government at Madrid has declared all Spain

in a state of siege. Gen. Guada, who was sent out with a detachment of royal troops against the Province of Santander has joined the insurgents. The reports that Gen. Prim is marching directly on Madrid are reiterated. He is accompanied by Gen. Serrano, the Duke de la Torre, and it is estimated that provisional president and civil head of the revolution. He has refused the offers of accommodation made by General Concha from Madrid.

The Spanish ships of war in the port of San Sebastian have declared against the Queen and joined the rebel fleet. The revolutionary leaders have issued a decree declaring that any officer who orders an at-

tack on the people or patriot soldiers shall be ad-judged a traitor to his country. A late despatch says: The Church, which is bound by every tie to the Queen, resists the revolutionists and holds the masses in check.

As far as can be ascertained from the various reports received up to the present hour, the insurrection extends throughout the province of Cadiz, Seville, Cordova, Huelva, Grenada, Valencia, Alicanta, Algeras, Mataya Vigo, Ferral, Corunna, and Ciordo, and many armed bands have appeared in the provinces of Huesca, Saragossa, Tennel and Navarre.

Gen. Pava, had arrived in the vicinity of Cordova. but his troops were deserting in large numbers, and he was obliged to stop his march and wait for reinforcements from Badajoz, which, at last accounts, had not yet reached him.

In regard to the rising in Spain, the official journals of Paris reflecting the feeling of the Emperor Napoleon are apprehensive of the effects of a grand revolution so near France, and seek in their leading editorials to discourage the movement. But it is generally believed here at London, that the revolution will be successful, and will result in the expulsion of the Bourbons from Spain, and probably in the ascension of the Montpensiers to the Spanish throne. A despatch from Paris says that Gen. Prim, with a fleet of iron clads, was expected at Barcelona to-day.

The Moniteur has the following from Spain :-" Alevya, a city of about 30,000 people, in the Province of Alicante, has revolted. Three ships appeared Sunday at Cartagena. It is supposed they were part of Gen. Prim's fleet. Marshal Paira of the Royal Army is still reconnoitering. It is said that the town of Leon has pronounced for the revolutionists. It is reported that Saragossa has rebelled and that Gen. Jean Pezuela, Count of Coristie, was killed."

The Moniteur of Sept. 29 has the following news from Spain : The city of Carthagena joins the revolt. Marshal Para of the Royal army at last accounts was completely surrounded by the insurgent troops, and is probably captured by this time.

The insurrection is general throughout Spain, and its thought, that Concha himself will soon join the insurgent General Serrano.

The rebels have retaken Santader. Cadiz has been declared a free port by the revolutionists.

The Paris journals despair of the Queen's cause. The Minister of the Interior has forbidden the passage of Spaniards through France on the way to Spain. The rebels are gaining strength daily while the efforts of the government to withstand the torrent are evidently becoming weaker. The last ship of the Spanish navy has now joined the rebels, and all reports indicate that public opinion throughout the Kingdom favours revolution.
