WASHINGTON, May 26,-The Senate this afternoon voted on the 2nd and 3rd articles of impeachment and acquitted the President. Vote standing 19 to The court of impeachment adjournd sine die. 35. It is believed that the second vote on impeachment assigned for to-day, will be further postponed. The impeachment managers have been taking testimony to shew that bribery was used to influence the vote of Senators and procure the President's acquittal. New York, May 26.—There is a rumor that the Fenians are concentrating near Ogdensburg, for a raid into Canada; and that our Government is taking measures to prevent them.

PROCEEDINGS AT OTTAWA. -- Mr. McCully's bill pro hibiting more than seven per cent, interest in Nova Scotia was accepted.-It is said that negotiations are in progress to renew the Reciprocity Treaty.
