Baron Von Goltz was received to day by the Emperor Napoleon as the Ambassador from Prussia and of the Confederation of the North German States. The Baron assured the Emperor of the earnest desire of his Majesty the King of Prussia for peace and for close friendship with France. Napoleon in his reply expressed in warm terms his approval of the unity of Northern Germany and hoped that Baron Von Goltz would continue to promote the peaceful relations between Prussia and France. FLORENCE.

King Victor Emmanuel in reply to an address of both Houses of the National Parliament says that Italy is now passing through a crisis surrounded by her foes, but he hopes for a good result and advises the Parliament and people to be calm.

News from Mexito to 27th of Dec., is to the effect that the rebellion in Yucatan is gaining strength. It is said that the rebels are aided by the English colonists in Belize. All Imperialists have been ordered from the Mexican republic. Porfirio Diar is to march immediately against the rebels with 3,000 men.

In the Southern States, the most lamentable ruin and desolation are said to prevail. Planters who calculated upon the price of cotton ruling high, have lost immensely, and have scarcely money enough to purchase provisions for the winter. Many who to purchase provisions for the winter. Many who were far-seeing had provided a year's supply for themselves and families; but the negroes have very generally pillaged their granaries and smoke houses. It is said by newspaper correspondents that upwards of 3,000,000 persons are on the verge of starvation in Louisianna, Mississippi, Georgia, Alabama and the Carolinas. Two thirds of this number are negroes. The contracts for labor in the plantations terminated in December; and as the freedmen have failed to supply themselves with stores for the winter, they are now without any visible means of support. They have begun already in many localities to threaten and plunder the whites, roaming the woods in the day-time in search of game, and at night pillaging the store houses of the planters. It is thought, that unless Congress provide some relief, the plundering of the whites will become general, and frightful riots

Some American papers sneer at the newly acquired territory in the North West. The climate of Alaska is represented as the worst in the world.
