dest inflict the contents of a written paper on the House, and sorely try the patience of the 900 in the gallery. As nothing new is elicited in any speech for or against Union, and as the House is in no hufor or against Union, and as the House is in no humor to attend to any other business, my legislative notes are, of consequence, barren of interest. As the Government, however, proclaim the Exchequer low, it seems a pity to expend upwards of \$400 a day for so many days in debating resolutions the House is determined to pass, particularly where the subject has been so well ventilated and worn so threadbare. It is believed that the Delegates will leave in the next steamer for England.

THE DISTRESS in the country, I regret to say, con tinues unabated. I hear that in one place some of the families have been obliged to subsist for days on boiled hay, while others have actually picked out the food thrown in to the hogs. Large amounts of aid have been received from abroad, for which every one, save a few politicians whose patriotism extends no further than their lips, are truly grateful.

A Working-Men's Tea-Merting.—About 60 work-

ing-men were invited to take tea together; about 40 assembled at the hour named and sat down to a substantial repast provided by the ladies of St. George's Parish. After tea, short addresses were delivered by some clerical and other gentlemen on Temperance, social, and religious sobjects. Music and singing were furnished by a detachment from the Industrial School. The meeting broke up by singing the National Anthem, and the Company dispersed, well pleased with their evening's entertainment. These meetings, besides furnishing a substantial repast to the hungry, are productive of great good by making the people feel that sympathy is felt for their want and distress, and encouraging them to bear patiently with the present hard times.
