NORA'S SHOPPING I need not repeat the rest of Gilbert's narrative word for word : it would occupy too much of my time, and, perhaps, unduly exercise your patience ; for details that cannot fail to be fraught

with deepest interest to me, may well be to other people thoroughly unimportant, if not tedions. So I will just give as succinct an account as possible of the remaining adventures of the small remnant of the crew of the unfortunate Ellerslie. ere they, two men only, sailed into Southam Harbour, and set foot once more on English soil.

After Captain Nicholson's death every thought was of course bent on leaving the island, But Gilbert and Simmons were told that it might be "several moons" before any ship came to those shores for water or fruit ; vessels, did come occasionally to the Vavao group, calling now at one, and new at another of the islands ; but they arrived at most uncertain intervals-sometimes appearing in quick succession, and sometimes not touching there more than twice, or even once, in the whole year. "A great ship," the natives said, had been there about half a moon before the strangers came ; she had taken in water, and limes, and fresh pork, and had gone on her way ; they could not tell at all when another ship might come-it might be to-morrow or next year ! So there was nothing for it but to wait with patience, and the two men lived on in the teut the natives had lent them for the captain's accommodation, and they fished and hunted, and did what work they could for a sustenance.

Presently, to their intense joy, a missionary arrived at Rara-that was the name of the island on which they had been thrown-and once more they heard their own tongue, and were able to procure all the information they desired. As they had snspected, Rara was one of the smallest and remotest of the habitable Vavaos, and they would be far more likely to meet with a vessel at one of the more important islands; therefore they accompanied the missionary in his small sloop. when, having transacted certain business, he returned to the great station at Waitoa, where they found others of his brethren with their wives, and sever of Frenchmen who had settled down among the natives. Here they were treated as honoured guests, and the missionary sloop was at once sent round to the other islands to give notice of the presence of the Englishmen, and of their desire to depart by the first vessel that came that way. And on the highest peak of Waitoa a flag was hoisted, as a signal to any ship in the offing, to

drop down into Waitoa harbour. Nevertheless, some weeks elapsed before the anxiously watched for sail appeared, and then it turned out that it was bound for California. It was a French yessel, and the captain of the Belle Marie would not alter his course, or promise to call at any port, and the good brethren of the mission would have persuaded Gilbert and his companion to remain with them till another and more favourable chance presented itself." But Gilbert, reflecting that it would be easier to com-municate with home from San Francisco than from the Vavaos, determined upon taking passage in the Belle Marie. He almost repented ; when after being a week at sea he found out that the wessel was not in good condition, or properly manned ; that her stores were scanty and half spoiled, and that the captain bimself was of a surly, taciturn disposition, and on bad terms with his men. Indeed, as time passed on, and the brig made little way, and half rations began to be talked of, the evil feeling increased, and ere they were half way from Waitoa to San Francisco there were manifest symptoms of a mutiny. The captain was alarmed, but, like many other foolish men in similar straits, he concluded to hold the reins of anthority with a tighter hand ; and since he confounded power with tyranny, and firmness with cruelty, it may be imagined that the most disastrous consequences were likely to ensue. And they would have ensued but for Gilbert's tact and heroism ; though I must not tell that story ; it would take too long, and if I once began it, I should not spare my readers a single incident or the veriest trifle of detail. Suf-fice it to say, that I am unspeakably proud of the part that Gilbert played on board the Belle Marie; and yet, when I recall the events of that long and dangerous voyage, I shudder to think of the perils he escaped, by a hait's-breadth, as it were : and I thank God, with beating heart and tearful eyes, for His merciful interposition, for His great goodness, in watching over my beloved frierd. and bringing him m safety into the desired haven. ⁰⁰ Arrived in California, Gilbert lost no time in despatching letters to England; but the whole package was lost, and never heard of more; pos-tal arrangements with those far off regions were by no means as well established as they are in our own day. After some time spent in going up the country, Gilbert engaged himself on board a merchantman bound to New York, where in due time he arrived, and tound, of course, plenty of English vessels ready to sail, according to advertisement. He chose one bound for Southam, and the rest of the voyage was accomplished with moderate speed, and without any fresh adventure. Crossing the Atlantic seemed no feat at all after all that beating about in Southern Seas, and after those fearful experiences in the Pacific. As Gilbert said, it was almost like the Little Gipsy skimming up and down the creek again, and even the fatal Serrars would no more be terrible to Then I had all my story to relate, from my flight from Cleeve to my return from Mrs. Druce's house. I had to tell of Mr. Scott's kindness, of Mrs. Brown's motherly solicitude and kindness, of the services rendered so heartily and so courtcously by my friends Messrs. Piccolo and Graud, of my various pupils, of my visit to St. Eldred's, and much more of the same kind. Gilbert was rejoiced to hear such happy tidings of little Mir-rie, as he still called her. The news of her good fortune, though, had already reached him during his brief stay at the North Fort ; and he wanted to know if she were as lovely, and as much like an angel-child as formerly ? Will it be believed, that as he spoke, a spasm of the old jealousy shot through my heart? It is so difficult thoraghly to extirpate the noxious weeds that have een suffered to spread themselves anchecked for my period of time.

Not for all the gold in California-and they tall out there as if the precious metals were as plen tiful and as attainable as coal and iron are with us-would I resume my post as heir to Mr. Saund erson. But for the old people, and also for some qualms of conscience which told me I was ungrateful to a man to whom I owed an excellent education, and whose intentions as regarded my future were most generous, I should have relin quished my connection with him long before did. Poor man ! he made himself and me very miserable. I can, however, freely forgive him for all his little tyrannies and tempers toward myself; it is when I think of his conduct to you, and with regard to you, that I find it diffi cult to think of him with Christian charity. But oh, Margaret ! how could you fancy that you ser ved me, that you saved me from distress, by leaving me without a word-without a look o farewell, even ? By what sophistry he deluded you I cannot think !"

Then I went again over the old ground, ex plaining how Mr. Saunderson had very sensibly shown me that I could not, as Gilbert's friend, hold him to an engagement, which would deprive him of every advantage, and fling him back, far less fitted for the encounter than in old time, on his own resources That out of very pity 1 could not reduce the poor old couple, and the delicate Alice, to their former straits.
