ITALY. The adjourned session of the Italian National Parliament was resumed yesterday.

Prime Minister Menebrea made a speech in which he confined himself to the subject of the Internal and Domestic affairs of the Kingdom. He exhorted the members to unite with the Government in resisting revolution, and upholding the National Credit, the donarchy and the obligation, as well as the liberties, of the Nation. No reference whatever was made by the Minister to the Roman question, or to the rela-

tions of Italy with Foreign Powers. The Budget which will be laid by the Ministry before the Italian Parliament calls for the adoption of the following measures to meet the liabilities and ex-penditures of the Government for the ensuing year; First the imposition of fresh taxes sufficient to produce the sum of 190,000 livres in addition to the present revenue; second, the authorizing of a new loan of 400,000,000 livres.

BRAZIL: SOUSSIE

Accounts from the interior of Paraguay, received by the last steamer from Rio Janeiro, show that the conditions and prospects of the Paraguayans are better than the Brazilians are willing to admit. President Lopez, in person, was in command at Humatia and held lines of communication with his capital Asunction and with the fortress of Curiputy uninterrupted. As the force of the Allied Powers were very weak in front of Humaita the Paraguayans defied them to undertake the siege. All classes of the population were as enthusiastically devoted to Lopez as ever, and making the most energetic efforts to supply him with men and provisions; but, pre-paring to push on on the war with vigor. The Brazilian Government was forwarding reinforcements, and the other powers were sending supplies of men and material to Rio Paranda.
