which bears his name, an institution which he lived to see in the glory of its youthful strength,

The college edifice erected by his munificence is one of the largest educational buildings on this continent. It is 500 feet in length, and upwards of 170 in breadth, and will accommodate some 400 pupils and their teachers. There are some two hundred acres of land belonging to the establishment, and the grounds are said to be all laid out in the most beautiful style imaginable. A catalogue just received for 1867-68 gives the present number of students as 339. teachers 35. It is a Baptist institution, but open to all denominations. It cost nearly half a million dollars, all denated by one man. In this way Mr. Vassar raised to his name a monument which reflects the highest credit to his name and memory.

On June the 23rd, while the celebrated founder Vassar College was reading to the Board of Trustees his annual address, he fell back in his chair and instantly died of disease of the heart. The conclusion of his address, which he did not live to utter, was singularly appropriate. In a few minutes, if he had lived, he would have said:

"And now, gentlemen, in closing these remarks, I would humbly and solemnly implore the Divine Goodness to continue His smiles and favors on your institution, and bestow upon all hearts connected therewith his love and blessings. He has peculiarly protected us by His providence through all our college trials for three consecutive years without a single death in our Board, or serious illness of one of our pupils within its walls. Wishing you, gentlemen, a continuance of health and happiness, I bid you a cordial and final farewell, thanking you kindly for your official attention and services. do not expect, from my advanced years and increasing infirmities, to meet with you officially again, and I implore the Divine Goodness to guide and direct you right in all your counsels and business

Besides the sum named above, Mr. Vassar be queathed in his last will and testament about \$350. 000, thus swelling his gifts to that one institution to some \$850,000, all for female education. Noble, generous soul, having in thy day sown bountifully, thou hast gone to reap bountifully.

The timid capitalist can lend gold on real estate, assured that his savings will not be swept away by the depreciation of the currency before the day of payment Banks can receive deposits in coin, and bind them-selves to pay in kind. Should the benefits of a return to the gold standard on the part of men who prefer it, prove to be as great as they expect, the use of gold com as the measures of values will gradually extend through all the channels of trade, and with increasing rapidity until the nation at large shall have quietly and without a crisis resumed specie payments, and can wait patiently for the government to do so at its leisure. - N.
