Home Training.

It will scarcely be contended by any one that our system of home training in this country is what it should and might be. We do not need to be told by foreign observers, as we often are, that American children are badly trained. We do not believe that they are by nature any worse than are English and German children. The fault lies not in them, but in those who have charge of their home education. Very many of the flagrant social evils of our day have their source directly in the neglected training of the young, and it is becoming a question which should engage the most serious attention for parents and all who feel an interest in the social, moral and religious advancement of our people, what shall be done to check the growth of the spirit of insubordination, extravagance and immorality which are now the bane of the home and society of this land ? A full reply to this question would cover a large field. We wish to indicate merely a few points bearing upon this subject.

The first is, that in home education it is especially true that the main source of influence and the indispensable condition of deep and lasting power, is a true sympathy between parent and child. There are many parents who are not at all indifferent to the real welfare of their children, who are greatly troubled as they see them growing up about them without any feeling of confidence in them, who mourn over their disobedience and seeming carelessness about home, to whom the thought seems never to have occurred that the fault is not all in their children, but very largely in themselves. LIFE IN A PILL BOX. PLANTING CORN IN DRILLS .- A correspondent of the Maine Farmer is satisfied it is a better plan to drill corn and drill manure in the rows than to plant and manure in the hill. This is the result of his experience :--

" In the spring of 1866, I prepared one acre o land for corn by spreading on forty-one horse loads of old manure, harrowing it in thoroughly. I then furrowed it lightly, and planted my corn in drills, each kernel four or five inches apart. with beans every four feet, and pumpkins every eight feet. The result was as follows : seventy bushels of good round ears, with five bushels of soft corn, five bushels of excellent beans, and fifteen cartloads of pumpkins. This was on newly broken-up land.






