When the Walda men, with Mashesba saw Ali, their former Chief, they reversed spears and rushed to him with joy. They then turned on Mashesba, defeated the remain-

der of his army and took him prisoner. Queen Mustevat with 12,00 Galla horsemen held Magdala, The priests say Menelek is the legitimate king. ANOTHER FENIAN SCARE IN CANADA. -- A Montreal special says, that the utmost alaam was caused by the Commanding General receiving telegrams of Fenians gathering at Buffalo and St. Albans. A battery of artillery has been ordered to the front, and volun-teers on the frontier were under arms all day Friday. I'wo companies have left for St. Johns. It is under stood that the two hundred Fenians at St. Albans will receive arms and uniforms from Boston.

A case of blasting fuse was seized at one of the wharves on Thursday night, the man in charge escap-

ing, after attempting to stab a policeman. It is rumored that many of the volunteers are Fenians, who will fire on their officers on getting into battle. Desertions are taking place at Preseott, and the garrison there is reported disaffected.

A programme for the Fenian invasion of Canada, in July next, supplies Gen. O. Neil with 30,000 troops-attacks Montreal with 15,000 men, marches 5,000 men from Buffalo against Toronto, and 3,000 from Detroit to the same point, and sends a body of 10,000 men to their support.

The ceremony of strewing flowers on the graves of the Union soldiers was observed on Saturday last throughout the Union. It was entered into with great enthusiasm in the North.

Six thousand dollars worth of tobacco, en route from Richmond for Boston, was seized on Saturday by the Revenue inspectors. There were counterfeit stamps on the packages.
