A few weeks ago, there passed away from earth, smitten by that featful scourge, the scarlet fever, a little one to whom Christ was precious, Lizzie was but ten years old when she died, and yet her life was rounded into symmetry, and her work completed in that brief time.

On one occasion there were in her Sabbath school class, two little girls who were very ragged and dirty. They were avoided by the other children. "They are poor little girls," she whispered to her teacher; "I'm afraid they don't have any-body to love them." And so she sat up close to them, and by little kindnesses, tried to make them feel at home. How much better for the church and for the world, if such a spirit pervaded older Christians.

There was a playmate of her own age, whose manners and language did not breathe the same sweet purity which characterized Lizzie. Lizzie's parents cautioned her against the influence of this child, not forbidding her to go with her, but telling her that she must not be led into wrong by Emma, but lead Emma into right. Not long after, Lizzie was walking up from Sabbath school with her friend, when she suddenly threw her arm about her neck, with the words, " Emma, I wish you were a Christian." Emma was much affected, and promised that she would try to become a Christian that very week. When Lizzic reached her home after this interview, she immediately went to her own room and prayed that her playmate might give herself to Christ.

She always had some fresh, original petition of her own to add to the prayer which she had learned at her mother's knee. She often would pray, " O God, forgive all the sins I have committed this day. Forgive papa, mamma, K---, and grandwother for their sins. Make us all good.

She once did something wrong, and was reproved for it by her mother. She went thoughtfully away, and soon came back, saying, " Mamma, I am very sorry for what I did. I have asked Gody to forgive me. Now wont you?"

She had a very thoughtful, observing disposition. She came home one day and asked her mother if such a one was a Christian. Her mother replied that she was afraid he was not. " I thought he couldn't be," said Lizzie, " because he didn't ask a blessing at the table.'

In her last sickness she said to her mother, " I used to tell lies sometimes. I remember one I told to my aunt when I didn't want to go to school. But I don't tell any now. I want to be a good girl. I want to be a Christian."

One Sabbath she was not feeling quite well, and her parents left her in the house alone, while they went to church. On their return they asked her if she had been afraid. "I was a little at first," she replied, " but then I remembered how Jesus said, 'Suffer little children to come unto me,' and I wasn't afraid any more.'

She dearly loved her Sabbath school hymns, and, as she was busied in her plays, she was always singing gently to herself something about heaven. Whenever she took up her singing book, she would turn first to the hymn,

"I'm but a stranger here, Heaven is my home.

At her funeral we sung her song of heaven. and also that beautiful chant by Rev. R. B. Fisk, " Suffer the children to come unto me. I love them. I love them, I lent them to thee When we joyed over them, thus Jesus saith, Thus he repeats at the coming of death, O suffer the children to come unto me. "Suffer the children to come unto me, Many a reason my wisdom can see Sighs would be mingled with praises and love Could ye but know as the angels above; Then suffer the children to come unto me. " Suffer the children to come unto me; Safer and happier where can they be? Hasten the work that thy Master hath given, He with thy children shall watch thee from heaven; Then suffer the children to come unto me."

And so with tears, and yet with joy, we gave her to her Saviour. The last time I met her while alive, was at a vestry gathering of our congregation. She came to me, saying she wanted me to go with her to another room, and then took me by the hand and led me there. As I look back upon that beautiful young life and take its sweet example of early piety to my heart, it seems as if a little hand were reaching to me from the spirit-land to lead me beavenward.

About Seeds.

Probably most of the readers of this have heard or read of the great labor, perseverance and expense of the Rev. Mr. Goodrich, in improving our potato, and resulting in the addition of several of the new varieties which are before the public; probably no man ever spent the same amount of time, labour and expense in improving any one article of agricultural production, as he did, during his life-time, in improving the potato. Only about half-a-dozen varieties were considered worthy of cultivation out of some sixteen thousand produced, thus showing the great uncertainty of seed producing even as good as its parent

Purity of seed is only retained, as above intimated, by careful culture, selection and perfect maturity, and freedom from any admixture of other foreign seed. Too much care cannot be exercised in selecting, cleaning and preserving seed—requisites too frequently unheeded by far too many farmers, who would find their profits greatly enhanced by proper attention to these

Soil and climate, as before intimated, exert a very strong influence on all varieties of seeds and products. Different varieties of soil give peculiar qualities to the same varieties of plants, thus showing the governing influence the soil exerts, and the connection of soil and product. The season, whether wet or dry, also affects the quality and quantity of produce, from any given mount of seed. The mode of culture, kind and quality of manure applied, amount, and how applied, besides many other causes, exert a marked influence over the products of any variety of seed: but in all cases it is found that with the same culture, &c., that superior seed produces superior product.

The rotation, of course, of cropping, will not only affect the quality of the product, but in a measure also the quality. In view, then, of the foregoing, it becomes the farmer who would improve his culture and obtain the best results from his labour expended, to plant only the best seed, and take special care in growing and saving his seed, and improving his crops by improving the quality of his seed and his general culture.

As to the weather, he cannot control that, but by careful management, under-draining where necessary, and thoroughly working the soil, he can greatly ameliorate the effects of unfavourable weather and seasons.—Country Gentleman,
