A Fish Story .- The Wolfville Acadian gives wonderful description of a fish recently caught at Lower Horton : "It had six feet of a tail, attacked to a junky body of eight feet in length. Its head resembles a pig's head with a small mouth, its fish was thick, and the cavity inside very small. There was one fin on its back a foot long, and one on each side two feet long. It is supposed to weigh about four hundred pounds."

NEW BRUNSWICK.

THE WEATHER, - While in St. John we have been enjoying very mild and pleasant weather, with the thermometer rarely over 70° in the shade, and even occasional fogs making their appearance, elsewhere in the province, as in the United States, the most extraordinary heat has prevailed. On the 14th, the thermometer, at Fredericton, reached 108° in the shade, and the average from 9 s. M. till 2 P. M. was over 100 degrees. Work was suspended on the railroad and in many other places. It is said that several deaths from sunstroke have occurred.

VICLENT STORM .- The tropical heat of Tuesday was followed on Wednesday, at Fredericton, by a violent H. thunder storm. The rain fell in torrente, and to so Jan great an extent as to raise the river so that the steamers are enabled to resume their trips to Woodstock. The lightning was productive of considerable mischief. No less than nine places in Fredericton and vicinity were struck. The Farmer says:

In the city, the chimney of Temple & Pickard's mill was considerably damaged. A new House in Waterloo Row was slightly damaged. A tree in the neighborhood of Alexander Thompson's, Douglas, was struck. At Gibson's Mills, Nashwaak, the electrie current struck the top of a small hill, ploughing up the ground for a considerable distance, and stunning several men who were working in the neighborhood. At Geo. L. Hatheway's twelve sheep were killed. At Mr. Miles', mouth of the Nashwask, a cow was killed. On the road running along the river bank in St. Mary's a fine horse was killed. This animal belonged to a Mr. Bailey, and was being driven by a lad named Marshall, whose mother was in the carriage with him. The horse was struck dead while standing, and on inspection it was found that his skull was split open. Both the boy and his mother were stunned, but they have since recovered. At Spring Hill, a barn belonging to Isaac Murray, Esq., containing twelve tons of hay was struck, set on fire, and totally consomed. At Oromocto, a house belonging to a Mr. Kimpbell, was, we are informed, greatly damaged. At Tobique eight cows and a

horse were struck by the lightning and killed. LIQUOR LICENCES. - The York County Council at a recent meeting resolved, by a vote of 14 to 11, to grant no licences to taverns for the remainder of this year, and that those already granted or applied for should be rescinded, and any money paid be relunded. JUDGE WILMOT, it is said, will be sworn in as Lieutepant Governor this week.

THE WOODSTOCK RAILWAY, was formally opened for traffic on Thursday last. About 500 excursionists from Woodstock passed over the line.

GOLD MINING .- The Farmer says :- It is currently reported in the ap-river country, that a New York Company propose erecting two quartz crushers on the Serpentine, and going into gold mining quite largely. The Company have become the assignces of Shay's grant of 15 square miles of wilderness, for mining purposes.

ACCIDENTS. - A man named Bernard Collins while working at Gibson's Mills, on the Nashwaak, a few days ago, was dangerously injured by a fall. A soldier was drowned in the river near Fredericton on Wednesday week.

DROWNED .- At South Bay, on the 15th inst., Mr. Wm. Wiseman, a contractor on Western Extension. Ah inquest was held on the body the same evening. Verdict "acoidentally drowned whilst in a fit." The Woodstock Acadian reports the death of two

brothers, named Wm. and Charles Crawford, at Lower Woodstock. . One of them had gone into the river to bathe. He got beyond his depth and being unable to swim was sinking, when his brother plunged in to rescue him, but only to share with him watery grave.

Fires .- On Saturday afternoon a fire broke out in a shed on Water street, which was used as a warehouse for oil. 56 barrels of Kerosene, together with the building, were consumed.
