Many we know would improve their own places by dividing their shrabs and perennials or reducing the number of shade trees which, in their zeal at first planting, have grown so large as to crowd and destroy the extent and character of their grounds. No true horticulturist should ever permit himself to ride or walk daily past an unsightly place or building without an attempt to change it by offering to plant a few trees. There is one other motive, also, in this giving or aiding a neighborhood. A tree or shrub is a thing of life; as a gift, it is received with feelings of respect; its daily sight is a bond of goodness; its bloom and opening leaves yearly, if not monthly remind the possessor of the giver. Do not, therefore, hesitate to give.

Music in our Schools.
