There is great excitement in Spain over the attitude alleged to be taken by the United States. Admiral Topete will command the leet that conveys reinforcements to the Spanish force n Cuba. Liberty of worship is to be proclaimed in Cuba. The Duke of Genoa is to marry the daughter of the Duke DeMontpensier, and ascend the Spanish

London, Sept. 20. - A demonstration in favor of the mprisoned Fenians took place to day. Processions were formed in Clarken well, and with bands of music bearing flags and mottoes marched in perfect order to Trafalgar Square. There a meeting was organ ized; six thousand persons were present. Geo. Henry Moore, member of Parliament for Mayo, pre-Resolves urging the unconditional pardon of the Fenians, were unanimously adopted. The proceedings were very enthusiastic, and no disturbance whatever occurred.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL. () N the recommendation of the Hon. the Acting Minister of Inland Revenue, and under and in virtue of the authority given by the Act 31 Vic., Cap. 50, intituled:—
"An Act to increase the Excise duty on Refined Petroleum, and to provide for the inspection thereof'—
His Excellency has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following Regulations shall be, and the same are hereby made and established:

REGULATIONS. 1st. All tar or other residium remaining in the Petroleum Stills after the process of distillation has been completed, and which is withdrawn from the stills without passing through the worm or condenser, be exempt from

duty.
2nd. When unfinished distillates of Petroleum are re moved from one Refinery to another for the purpose of completing their manufacture, no inspection fee shall be levied thereon until after such manufactures shall have been completed, and the finished Petroleum either entered for consumption or warehoused for that purpose, notwith standing anything to the contrary contained in the Order in Council of the 30th day of May, 1868.
