Rflecter speaks of this remarkable man thus : - "The name of George Peabody will forever live in history as that of one of the greatest benefactors of his country and of mankind. It has been recently noted that the aggregate of his various benefactions reaches seven millions of dollars. The two millions and up-wards given to the Southern Educational Endowment is now, as we are most credibly informed, to be considerably enlarged. It was recently suggested to this noble minded man that a certain sum added to this already magnificent endowment would enable its custodians to comprehend more entirely their practical conception of the wants of the South in the matter of primary education. Mr. Peabody, with the enlightened benevolence characteristic of the man, responded at once that the amount required to that end should be placed at their service. We are not at liberty to state the precise additional amount hereby to be realized; it will, however, be safe to put it at hundreds of thousands of dollars. The results already achieved by this educational enterprise for the South are most cheering and promising for the future. This is no less than might have been looked for under the wise and efficient direction of Rev. Dr. Sears, General Agent of the Fund, and Hon. R. C. Winthrop, who is chairman of the Board of Trustees. All these able gentlemen, in laying broadly their plans for the future, are incited thereto by motives full of encoragement. Relatives of Mr. Peabody who have recently visited the South bring very assuring reports of the work there being accomplished. We learn that Mr. Peabody himself, accompanied by Dr. Sears, Mr. Winthrop and others, we presume, has in con-templation a tour of visitation through the South in the course of the coming autumn, all having primary reference to the working of the educational system which he has inaugurated in various parts of that great and needy land."

STARTLING BURGLARY .- On Monday morning, June 28th, it was found that burglars had entered the vaults of the Ocean Bank, in this city, and carried off money and bonds to the amount of nearly a million of dollars. About June 12th a stranger hired of a broker in the basement of the building a small office for an insurance agency, and moved in at his leisure a desk, wardrobe, etc. By standing upon this desk, the burgiars cut through the floor into the banking room above. How the thieves opened the costly combination lock on the principal door to the vault is not known, but a second iron door was open-ed with the key left hanging there, and the third was pried from its hinges with powerful jackscrews, sledges and cold chisels, with which implements they made their way into the two Marvin safes. Much of the property belonged to private individuals, being deposited there for safety. On Wednesday morning a small trunk was found standing on the sidewalk in the Sixth Ward, directed to Capt. Jourdan, of the Police, which was found to contain \$270,000 of the missing bonds and securities.

THE CUBAN EXPEDITION COSt from \$250,000 to \$600,000, has failed. The men and the material of war eluded the vigilant search which was instituted against them by the national authorities; but after having succeeded in reaching a point off Gardiner's Island, at the eastern end of Long Island, a number of men were allowed by their officers to visit New-London for the purchase of provisions, and the whereabouts of the expedition was ascertained, when a revenue cutter despatched from New-London captured the whole expedition. The total forcemen, arms, ammunition, with one propeller, three tugs, and two schooners—lies now in the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

Thirteen divorces were granted in Hampden county, Mass., last week. The parties are all " native and to the manner born."

CONNECTICUT DIVORCES. - The statistics of divorce in Connecticut are startling. During last year the divorces numbered 478, or more than one tenth of the number of marriages. All the marriages celebrated in the State during the year are included in the total

The Ohio Legislature has passed a law prohibiting the marriage of first cousins and of girls under sixteen. It also provides that the marriage of any young lady under twenty-one years of age, without the consent of her parents, shall not be valid.

A DOUBLE HEADED GIRL has been on exhibition in Tremont Temple during the past two weeks. It is simply two perfect children joined firmly at the hips and spine. Above the point of joinature they are distinct, and perfect in every part. At and below the point where they join all duplication ceases, and they become one. They are much more firmly and curiously united, than the "Siamese Twins." They possess distinct minds, but agree well together, converse together like two different persons, eat different things, have distinct tastes about food. One often sleeps, while the other is awake, and reading. Both profess to love the Savioor. They have a remarkable brain development, and are very pretty colored children, in no manner unpleasant to look upon. Their parents are poor, but are entitled to one-half of all that is made by their exhibition. They have a Christian woman who travels with them. These facts are derived from a half hour's conversation with the children themselves, with no one present but the nurse, and are believed to be reliable.
