Great excitement is prevailing in Athens, M. Bulgarias, the retiring Prime Minister, is immensely popular, and extensive demonstrations of sympathy are much in his favor by the citizens.

ATRENS, Feb. 6.—The Senate to-day after twenty-eight hours continued session passed by a two-thirds vote the universal suffrage Amendment to the Constitution.
