PACIFIC RAILWAYS .- An English ecoppany is now engaged in building a Railwey which is intended to extend from Norfolk, Va., to Diego, on the Pacific. The northern or Canadian rote has, therefore, a decided advantage, in espect to length, as it has also in a pass tough the Rocky Mountains some four thous d feet lower than either of the others. Seven days from Ireland to Halifax might be regarded as an average voyage, and seven days from Halifax to the Gulf of Georgia would be an ample allowance for a good railroad, so that passengers would be set down on the Pacific in 14 days, or only some two or three days more than an average passage from Liverpool to New York; and reckoning the shorter voyage from thence to China, in five or six days less time from Liverpool to Shanghai than by the present route, and for a much lower rate of


