In the House of Commons this evening the Irish Church Bill being brought up Mr. Gladstone said there was no intention of abolishing the system of national education of Ireland, but that amendments might be introduced.

Mr. Monsell in reply to Mr. Chokley, said he thought an appropriation of Loan for an Intercolonial Railway to pay the debts of Canada would not be illegal, considering the precautions taken to render the same available when needed.
