The Governor-General of the Dominion, on his late visit to Charlottetown, was received with all the honors that belong to his dignified position as the representative of British rule on this continent. It is cheering to read the expressions of warm and hearty loyalty that fell from the lips of representative men of the Island as the several topics of discussion were presented at the different meetings held during the short stay of his Excellency. The way is evidently preparing rapidly for the reception of the Island at no distant day as an integral portion of our growing Dominion. All hearts truly loyal to the "old flag" will give this charming sister a cordial welcome.

NOVA SCOTIA. Halifax, last week, presented herself before the world in a very humiliating position. No City of the Dominion, of equal size, is so largely indebted as Halifax, to British protection and British gold. Her dockyards, her citadel hill, and her expensive barracks for the accommodation of a British soldiery, and the mighty naval ships constantly seen in her magnificent harbour-all testify to the immense treasures of English gold and silver poured into her lap. In view of all this, one would naturally suppose that gratitude alone would hold in check every current of thought hostile to Englaud's sceptre; but not so. At meetings held in the Temperance Hall, for the purpose of considering the reception of the Governor General, as the head of the Dominion and the representative of England's Queen, expression was given to sentiments of a highly disloyal type. So much so in fact, that the Judges of the land evinced their dissatisfaction by suddenly starting from their seats, and leaving the Hall where they were uttered. But it is pleasing to know, that notwithstan ding these occasional outbursts, that the wealth, inligence and religion of Halifax is loyal to the core. RECEPTION AT HALIFAX on Monday, as given in the Telegraph of Tuesday morning. Here it is :

The scene baffles description, owing to the extraordinary outburst of loyalty.

Near the Station, which was decorated and a new platform made, were arch upon arch, flags and mottoes of welcome became so thick across Granville and other streets they came in contact with the carriages.—Fully six thousand people were around the Station and up the roads—a Guard of Honor of Volunteers and immense line of carriages, chiefly four horses. The Mayor in his robes met the Governor General, also Sir Hastings and suite, and boquet after bequet was presented to Lady Young.

The Mayor presented the Address of himself and over two thousand citizens—quite a large roll. Near the Mayor were the Archbishop of Halifax, Judges, &c. His Worship read the Address in a loud voice, so that many around heard. Sir John, with Lady Young and Suite standing beside, read his reply distinctly and the moment it ended a great cheer was taken up by the crowd and rolled up the hill-side and along the roads. Sir John and Lady manifested visible emotion, and Sir George was greatly delighted. I have not seen anything more hearty. Several


