A Brief Review of the News of the Week.

His Excellency the Governor General and Lady Y. O'Connell, accompanied by Sir George Carter and suite arrived by H. M. S. *Saracota*, on Monday night. The party did not disembark, however, until Tuesday morning, and then somewhat unexpectedly at the Waverley House, where they remained until before nine o'clock. At the Indian Landing, a large crowd of persons were assembled to witness the departure of His Excellency and party for Fredericton. At a few minutes before 9 o'clock, His Excellency and Lady, and Sir George Carter arrived in an open barge. Lady Y. O'Connell, at once, accompanied by the Minister of Agriculture, and a few other gentlemen, accompanied by the Mayor and representatives of the Lunenburg Committee, who accompanied His Excellency's pleasure with regard to the hospitalities tendered to him. It was finally agreed that His Excellency would hold a levee in St. John at the Court House, on Saturday afternoon, and attend the Luncheon in the Rink at 3 o'clock.

**FREDERICTON, Aug. 31.**—The steamer *David Weston*, with the Governor General and party on board, arrived at Sherman's Wharf about 4:15 o'clock. The Governor General was received with a Guard of Honor comprising the Victoria Rifles and the Saint John Volunteers, under Captain Hewitt and Staples. The Governor General was not on board, but Governor Wilnot as Colonel of Volunteers. The streets were thronged with spectators, and flags were flying in every direction. Obsequies were displayed twenty-three flags. There was also one street of flags from the City Hall across the street. The whole affair was under the direction and control of Governor Wilnot, whose guest the Governor General is during his stay.

**STREET RAILWAY.**—The operations on the Street Railway have now reached as far as the corner of Prince William and Duke Streets. In two weeks the cars will be running from terminus to terminus.

**ALL THE LIGHTS ON THE ST. JOHN RIVER** are now in operation. They were lighted for the first time on Monday night.

**HALLFAX, Aug. 31.**—The Ball to-night in Province Building in honor of Prince Arthur, was a magnificent affair, in numbers, respectability and management.

To-morrow, a Pic Nic will be held at Prince's Lodge, and a torchlight procession will be organized on return from it. Great preparations on foot to make the Pic Nic a splendid affair.

To-morrow has been proclaimed a Holiday by the Mayor.

An inquest was held before Coroner Earle on Tuesday morning, over the body of Mary Jane McDart, run over on Saturday by a horse and driven by John Henderson. The following verdict was returned: "That deceased came to her death from injuries received from a horse and driven." From the evidence given, the jury thought that the driver was not to blame.

**FIRE AT SOUTH BAY.**—The fine water mill at South Bay, belonging to E. Sutton & Co., was destroyed by fire on Sunday morning. The fire is supposed to have originated in some way from the sawdust furnace. The mill contained a gang, three single saws and two machines, the greatest portion of which were destroyed, only the belt and the large water wheel having been saved. With the loss of about \$200,000 worth of lumber was burned, and the loss would reach nearly \$300,000, on which there is only \$300,000 insurance in Mr. Allison's office.

Mr. Matthew White, living at Sand Point, was drowned at Red Head on Saturday afternoon. He, with his wife and some other parties, left their residence in the morning to go berrying at Red Head. When they arrived there the tide was low, and they anchored their boat, when on their return from berrying, they found they could not get without another boat, the tide having risen. An old punt was on the beach, which White and another of the party landed, but when about half way to the boat, the punt swamped, and before assistance could be rendered White was drowned. The other party swam ashore.

On Monday morning, a man named John McLachlin was found dead in a house on the Indian road. He was lying on the floor in one corner of the room with some old clothes under his head. An inquest was held by Coroner Rigby and a verdict in accordance with the facts returned.

ENGLISH AND EUROPEAN.

**LONDON, Aug. 27.**—It is stated that over a million people witnessed the Harvard and Oxford boat race. Harvard won the toss for position and got the start, making forty-five strokes per minute to Oxford's forty; kept the lead half a boat's length for three-eighths of a mile. At Chiswick boats were even, and Oxford's obtained lead of two lengths, where Harvard held them for half a mile, when they fell behind, and Oxford's, pulling thirty-eight strokes a minute were three lengths ahead at Barnes Bridge, three and five-eighths miles pulled. Harvard were enthusiastically received at the finish. Oxford's won by four lengths.

**LONDON, Aug. 28.**—The judge says there was only half a length of difference between the Harvard and Oxford boats at the finish.

**PARIS, Aug. 27.** The Emperor Napoleon's health is improving.

Latest advices from Paris say the Emperor's condition grows more and more satisfactory.

**LONDON, Aug. 31.**—The London Times, in an editorial on the late boat race, says that for gallantry, energy and pluck, the Harvard set an example which cannot be excelled.

Only fifty Bishops have declined to attend the Ecumenical Council at Rome.

The Irish residents of London held two meetings yesterday, at which a Fenian amnesty was urged.

A Paris despatch this evening confirms the report that the Emperor's health is improving.

**LONDON, Aug. 31.**—The story of a conspiracy, followed by executions on board the United States frigate *Sabine* at Cherbourg, telegraphed from Paris some days since, is contradicted.

A grand fête was given at the Crystal Palace, Synodical last evening, in honor of the Harvard and Oxford Oarsmen. There were present 120 invited guests, including Charles Dickens, Thomas Hughes, Edmund Yates, Captain Anderson and other notable. Charles Dickens made an eloquent speech.

**UNITED STATES.**

**BOSTON, Aug. 30.**—Twenty-two sailors of the U. S. frigate *Sabine*, attempted to blow up that ship in the harbor of Cherbourg by setting fire to the Powder Magazine. After the fuse was lighted it was discovered by a cabin boy. Seven of the conspirators have been condemned to death, and will be hung at the yard arm.

**NEW YORK, Aug. 31.**—A riot of Coal Miners was feared at Scranton, Pennsylvania, last night, and four hundred special Police were sworn in, besides seven hundred men enrolled as volunteers, under command of Colonel E. Boyce. The Coal Mines are all under guard.

**NEW YORK, Aug. 31.**—Money quiet at six percent; sterling exchange 109 1/2; gold 135 1/2.
