Deur Brother Bill, I can comprise in a few lines the subject of what it may be proper for the friends of the Micmac Mission to know respecting our operations during the past year. Please insert them in the VISITOR.

1st. The Book of Exodus has been for some time ready to be published. Arrangements had been made some time ago with one of the Halifax printers to do the work. After waiting a very long time for him to procure the extra types necessary, which he did not succeed in doing, the agreement by mutual consent was cancelled and a new one made with another man. Advantage was taken of this delay to revise the whole work anew, and re-copy a portion of it. We expect the work will be completed during the present winter, at the expense of the B. and F. B. So-2nd. In addition to the above I translated into

Micmac and have carefully copied out, the Ep stles to the Romans, Galatians, and Hebrews, and also the Gospel of John in Maliseet. It may be proper to mention that the work of copying out these languages for the press, is necessarily slow and laborious. Every letter must be distinctly formed in a round "copy hand," as the printer since he does not understand the language, and cannot even pronounce the words when written ever so fairly, can have no guide in setting up the types except the distinctness of each letter. There can be no guess work, as in English, where the context and the dots and crosses and a letter or two plainly written, will often give a tolerable clue to the scrawls and scratches that make up the rest of the word. "Copy" in a foreign tongue must be tairly written.

3rd. Direct missionary labor has been contioned as heretofore. No great or striking results can be mentioned. Faith and patience continue to be sorely tried, although one who has carefully watched the work for years cannot but be impressed with the many and marked indications of the divine approbation and blessing, which are to be seen in all directions. Prejudice and direct opposition to our labors, and even indifference, more trying if possible than opposition, is giving way on all hands, and instead of shrinking from the "Anakims" and the "cities walled up to heaven," the language of Caleb, who "followed the Lord fully," is more in accordance with duty and encouragement, "Let us go up at once and possess the land, for we be well able to overcome it." 'Oh for more grace,' more faithfulness, more earnestness, more of the Holy Spirit's influence on my own heart, on all our hearts, and on their hearts!

4th. Four years ago at our Annual Meeting held in Chalmer's Church, Halitax, Jan. 26, the following resolution was at my own particular request, adopted, viz.:

"Resolved, That it shall be a fixed principle of this Society hereafter to contract no debts. All labor performed by any member of the Society in aid of its objects, shall be, as far as possible, gratuitous. It shall be no part of the duty of any persons employed as Missionaries to solicit funds. But they shall be at liberty to receive public collections and private donations. They shall receive no fixed salary, but shall accept as their pay whatever God shall put it into the hearts of the people to contribute for that object. While, however, the work of the Society is designed to be conducted in future as a 'work of faith and labor of love,' depending entirely on the Lord for assistance and success, the committee shall not neglect to use such means as will most effectually keep the object and claims of the Mission before the churches."

I was lately asked by a beloved brother in the ministry, how I came to adopt the plan embodied in the above resolution. I told him, and I here repeat the statement that I adopted the plan, after long and careful deliberation, and much prayer and fasting, for divine guidance, because I thought it would succeed, and that it would honor the Lord, and be the means of increasing my own faith and devotion, and that of others. I saw too that if successful it would obviate some of the most serious objections to our work, and remove many of the most formidable obstacles. I need not here go into details. The successful experience of four years and a half (for I began to practice on the principle July 1st, 1864,) has not lessened, but confirmed my convictions on all those points. There are, as must have been expected, many, and some whose faith and piety we are unwilling to call in question, who cannot comprehend the matter, who cannot allow any direct divine agency in it, who affect to account for everything wonderful about it, on natural principles. And I have even heard it suggested that "the lying wonders" and "all deceiveableness of unrighteousness" predicted as about to come in the latter days, might possibly be the true ground of our success. But wherever I have the happiness to meet believers who are more than ordinarily heavenly minded, those who know by experience what it is to go to their Heavenly Father in their troubles and find relief, here I find those who have no difficulty in the matter. They recognize the finger of God, the fulfilment of his exceedingly great and precious promises. Their own faith is strengthened and heir thanksgivings abound, and by our mutual sith we are comforted.

The past year it is well known has been one of great commercial embarrassment and depression. But we have suffered no inconvenience on this account.
