considered decidedly superior to the one which is now working across the Atlantic, in that it has greater working across the Atlantic, in that it has greater conductivity. UNITED STATES.

UNITED STATES. A terrible accident occurred on the Erie Railway, at Mast Hope station, 30 miles from Port Jervis, on Wednesday night, by which fifteen human beings were suddenly crushed and bruised, and eight were finally burned to death. An extra (42 cars) to freight train No. 89, lay in the long switch at Mast Hope, waiting for the express to pass.
