GREAT FIRE IN SOUTH CAROLINA. - About a week ago the Cincinnati Chronicle published the following description: A terrible conflagration has been raging for the last two weeks in All-Saints' Parisb, Horry County, South Carolina. It-broke out near the up-per end of Ocean Bay, not far from the sea-shore, and has burned over a distance of nearly 20 miles. The breadth of the fire is unknown. The country through which it passed is literally burned up. Swamp after swamp has been made bare of all undergrowth, and the trees and timber completely destroyed. The savannahs, with the turpentine boxes, are made sterile wastes. Twenty thousand turpentine boxes have been burned. The cattle range is destroyed for the season, the deer unsheltered, and the bears and rattlesnakes made to seek a new hiding-place, or be destroyed by the fire. It is estimated that over 100,000 acres of land have been burned over, and at night the heavens were brilliant from the Jurid flames, and the clouds of smoke that arose by day were but portents of the fiery storm beneath.


