ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

The diplomacy of Washington on the Alabama uestion is most distasteful to the English press. The London Freeman in speaking of this matter says : Americans complain of our not showing adequate respect to their Government; how is it possible i their Government shows no respect to itself. A minister here who behaved as Mr. Seward has done in this treaty business, could not hold up his head for an hour in either House of Parliament or before the country. Even after the treaty was concluded Mr. Johnson endeavoured to get a supplementary treaty, intended to require the British Government to defend its conduct on the neutrality proclamation before arbitrators! This last indignity Lord Clarendon of course refused to submit to. His Lordship's view of the present is all that could be wished. He thinks Americans are beginning to understand and repudiate the extravagance of Mr. Sumner's speech, and that both he and Mr. Johnson have in different ways done good service. Mr. Sumner's speech was received with universal censure and indignation that Americans will know that, ' however much we desire peace, and however highly we value our relations with the United States, there is one thing we value more, and which we can never submit to sacrifice--our national honour.'

The destruction Carnarvon, Wales, by nitro-glycerine is noticed in all the papers as a most calamitous event. When the material exploded horses and men were blown to atoms. The railway station near was torn to pieces, and a village a quarter of a mile distant was damaged as if shaken by an earthquake. The Irish Church Bill is working its way through the House of Lords, and in despite of Lord Derby and others of like faith.

John Bright and William E. Foster have resigned their membership in the Reform Club in consequence of the failure of that Club to elect as an honorary member a gentleman whose name they had proposed LONDON, July 5. - In the Spanish Cortes, Saturday, the Ministers of the Interior and Justice declared that the clergy and municipal authorities were ready and willing to take the oath prescribed by the Constitution. Admiral Topete, in reply to a question of Senor Orenz, said that the idea of a Republic was impossible, now that a Monarcahy had been voted and was represented by the Regent. The National
