The entrance to the Mausoleum faces east, and is reached by a flight of black marble steps, leading to a porch supported by granite columns, with a ceiling decorated with Venetian Mosaics. The floor of the entrance, as well as of the entire structure, is formed of variegated marble, polished and inlaid in panels of various designs.

When the girl came down to the hunter, she fell stiff, and was not able even to indicate what was the matter. The rough gallant then heard the scream of the child, and soon found a fine, healthy, rosy boy, with torn clothes, but otherwise uninjured, endeavoring to rise upon his little feet. The tears streamed down his innocent cheeks, and his face wore a most piteous expression. The hunter took the baby in his arms and carried it to the girl, who was now recovered. She clasped it to her bosom, covered it with kisses, and wept with joy, The parents in the meantime had missed the little one, and had become very uneasy. There was laughing and crying enough when the wanderers returned, and the wonderful voyage of the little fellow was explained .- Tribune.


