### Trimming Trees.

When is the best time to prune fruit trees? This question calls out many different opinions, but as a general practice, farmers go through their orchards in spring and take out all wood that is not needed. There are good reasons for this practice. It is a leisure time. The ground being frozen, the sod is not disturbed. There is no growing grass to be injured by passing over it. It is easy, too, to remove the brush cut from the trees. As there is no foliage it is easier to see what limbs to take out, and easier to get about in the tree, than it will be later in the season. Of course it is best to thin out from year to year a little at a time. There will then be no large wounds and no excessive exuding of sap. Suckers or gluttors, by which is meant the shoots that run up straight from large limbs, should always be cut out. They seldom bear fruit, and make a draft on the tree for nothing. All dead wood and interfering branches should also be removed. In our hot summers the danger is from too much pruning. Orchards are sometimes thinned to only a few long branches, leaving a large open space in the tree which is so much loss. Cultivate and manure well, prune sparingly, and your trees will give larger and better crops. - Congregationalist.
