the principal interests of the Province. Mr. Dawson's report on the Red River route recom mends the opening of communication at once between Lake Superior and the Red River Settlement in such a way as would admit of the route being immediately used, and then to proceed with further works until a first class line of communication is completed the cost of the preliminary line to to be about \$250, 000, and the probable ultimate cost of a railroad and continuous navigation about \$5,800,000.


