Agricultural Items.

CARE OF THE HEALTH. - Farmers ought to be a healthful class, and as a rule, they are so. But oftentimes they are very careless. As the warm spring days come on, changes from thick to thin clothing are often made imprudently. It is not uncommon to find severe colds that might be traced to sitting in the cool air of the evening without sufficient clothing, and when the body is warm from labor. So throwing oneself on the damp ground while resting from work may be a cause of sickness. Farmers' boys are proverbially profit." anxious to go bare-footed, but they may be over anxious about it. They are also auxious to have a "swim" as soon as possible, and often go into the water when it is too chilly.

The importance of cleanliness of the person is often overlooked by farmers and farmers' boys. Sometimes much more labor and time is expended in keeping the horses clean than in keeping the members of the family clean, and certainly it ought to be as important in the latter as in the

A proper supply of vegetable food in the spring is very important, while it is equally important to avoid an excessive use of such food on its first

Industry is highly commendable, but over exertion is as strongly to be condemued. The attempt to do a great day's work has resulted in the loss of many days labor.

Common sense properly exercised, good food, cleanliness of the person, avoidance of needless exposure, reasonable labor, are more important in preserving health than "bitters" or any of the nostrums of the shops.

CABBAGE.—The cabbage requires a deep, rich soil, and thorough working. If these requirements are met and good seed obtained, there is no difficulty in obtaining fine, solid heads. For early use, the plants should be started in a hotbed or cold frame, but seed for winter cabbage should be sown in a sced-bed early in the spring. Some varieties seem to do best if the seed is sown in the hills where they are to remain, and this is particularly the case with the Marblehead varieties. Sow two or three seeds where each plant is desired and then pull up all but the strongest. The large varieties require to be planted about three feet apart; the small, early sorts, from a foot to eighteen inches. Always give cabbage a deep, rich soil, and keep it mellow. For early winter use, keep a few in a cool cellar. The main crop will be better kept out of doors, set in the earth closely, and covered with straw or leaves. with a little earth over all .- Vick's Guide.

THE VEGETABLE GARDEN .- For the majority of gardeners, including, of course, the farmers of our country, rather than those for whom gardening is their only business, this will be the month in which the most vigorous efforts in garden planting will be made. Many have not been able to carry out the directions given for their guidance in previous months; and yet they desire to have a garden. Nor is it yet too late to do a great deal in this way, which is one of the pleasantest and cheapest modes of providing for the needs of the family. It is a common saying, that "a good garden is half a living." This is true. Aye, it is more than that. But it can not be said of the farmers' families that they have half a living when they have no garden. WHAT USE HAVE WE FOR CROWS ?- Farmers regard crows as their natural enemies. This is a wrong view to take, for the question may well be discussed whether crows do more harm than good. A flock of crows on a newly plowed field will destroy more white grubs and cut-worms than are seen by the farmer and his men in the course of an entire season, and where these pests are abundant in cornfields, the crows will, as the writer has repeatedly seen, go from hill to hill, stopping only at those where a wilted spear shows that grubs or cut-worms are at work. Now, it may be all very well to say a good word for the crows when they deserve it, but few are inclined to do so when they find hill after hill of corn pulled up, or see the rascals at work pulling the young wheat, or tearing up the husks of the roasting ears.

It is no easy matter to trap a crow, and yet it may be done. We give a plan which is said to be very sure in its operation. A steel trap is laid in the shallow water of a pond, and a tuft of grass is placed upon the pan, and partly conceals the trap. Then the crow's natural fondness for eggs is taken advantage of in selecting the bait, and a blown egg-shell put upon a stick, which is stuck in the bottom of the pool at such a distance from the trap that to get it the crow must first light upon the tuft of grass. The egg is half filled with water, and seems to float only a little out of water. The jaws of the trap should be bound with tow or wrapped with cloth, to prevent them breaking the bird's legs. The trap must be frequently looked to, lest a crow being caught becomes exhausted, and falling over into the water be drowned. When one is taken, it may be brought to the cornfield, it wings bound fast to a stick, or in some way pinioned so that it cannot fly, and then tied. Its cries will attract all the crows in the vicinity, who will come down close to it, but do no damage to the corn. If a crow is pinioned on its back it is said that it will clutch and hold any crow that comes near enough. (This we have heard called a Maryland crow trap.) We are assured by Mr. J. H. Mabbett, who gives us this plan of eatching crows, and who has practiced it with success, that during the rest of the season no crow of the neighborhood will light upon a field where a crow has been so displayed .- American Agriculturist.

A correspondent of the American Agriculturist inquires for a "solution for glazing flower pots," to which it was replied: "Why glaze flower pots at all ? All florists reject them as worthless. The porosity of the pot is essential to the well-being of most plants. A sickly plant in a pot which has its pores filled up, will often recover if put into a new and porous one."

Currant and gooseberry bushes start early, and should be transplanted as soon as practicable. Prone those that need it.

Carrant cuttings should have been put out last fall, but they will do fairly if set now. Pack the earth well about their lower ends.

A clay soil turned up when wet, with the sun immediately upon it, will not only make it unfit for planting, (the soil being harsh and lumpy) but hurt it for years. This has been expressed frequently before. We have repeated it as a matter too much overlooked.

Now is the time to sow plaster on pastures. One or two bushels is the right quantity. In some places its effects are wonderful. On the seaboard, however, plaster is considered of little or no benefit to land. The best way is for every
