"At Bathurst, the Hon. John Ferguson has a farm of 350 acres, in a high state of cultivation, which would not fear to stand a comparison with some of the best farms in Ontario. It is thoroughly well cleared; has about 50 miles of cedar fence upon it; and shows as fine a crop of oats, barley, coarse grains, potatoes, and about 70 acres of spring wheat, as any ne would wish to see. He raises about 200 tons of hay, has 20 acres of potatoes, about 60 acres of oats, and a large number of acres with a fine show of turnips. This shows what the land is capable of by proper cultivation, and there can be no doubt that proper energy and skill, will in a few years, make a splendid farming country extending over a very

The crops of Nova Scotia as a whole were probably never better than they are this year. The weather throughout the season has been universally fa vorable. Hay is more than an average yield. It is said that all the resources of the Acadia Iron Mines will be called into requisition to provide rails for the Intercolonial Railway. It is expected that 24 miles of this road, extending from Truro to Folly Lake, will be put under contract immediately, and will be pushed through with the least possible delay.
Report says the Windsor and Annapolis Railway
will be opened on Wednesday the 18th inst.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND. On the night of the 6th inst., the steamer "Prin-

cess of Wales" collided with the steamer "St. Lawrence." Both boats seriously damaged. Passengers in both boats much alarmed, but the "Princess of Wales" towed the "St. Lawrence into Summerside. All passengers saved.

ENGLISH AND EUROPEAN. The Church of England are just now making great efforts for providing the English emigrants to South America with churches and with schools. Lendon, Aug. 9. - The Empress Eugenie leaves

Paris for the East on the 24th inst. London, Aug. 10.—The joint committee of the Atlantic and Anglo American Telegraph Companies and the Directors of the New York and Newfoundland Company have decided on a reduction of transoceanic telegraph rates to \$7.50 per message of ten words, and 75 cents extra word. The press rates are one half the regular tariff.

These rates go into operation to day. Spain is still in great political trouble. The insurrection of the Carlists has not yet been put down. According to the cable dispatches, several fights have taken place between the Government troops and the Carlists, and the latter are said in every case to have been defeated; but from a number of places the appearance of new bands is announced; thus from the provinces of Pontevedra and Leon. The cities of Toledo and Avila were reported to have pronounced for Don Carlos. The latter, however, according to the Paris Moniteur, has reentered France. There is much dissatisfaction in Madrid at Napoleon's lenity toward the Carlist conspirators on the frontiers, and the press is severely commenting upon it. Bands of "Volunteers of Liberty" throughout the kingdom are offering their services to the Provisional Government to assist in the suppression of the Carlist in-

MADRID, Aug. 10 .- The Carlist bands in Spain are everywhere meeting with defeat. Balanscetequa, a leader in the interest of Don Carlos, has been condemned and shot. It is reported that large bands, well armed and organized, composed of officers and soldiers and members of the clerical party have assembled in the Northern Districts of Spain.

The Republic of Ecudor has been declared in a state of war by the National Convention.

France — A large number of military furless has been declared.

FRANCE.—A large number of military furloughs has been granted or extended, which it is estimated will be equivalent to a reduction of the army by 18,-

The Empress Eugenie is preparing for her journey in the East. She will remain about twelve days in Constantinople in the midst of the fetes to be celebrated in her honor, both in the capital and on the banks of the Bosphorus.

The Emperor will leave for the Camp of Chalons on the 12th inst.

CHINA. - Dr. MacGowan, the agent of the East India China.—Dr. MacGowan, the agent of the East India Relegraph Company, is still urging the project of connecting China with the British Territories in India by a telegraph line traversing Burmah and Yunnau. The Russian telegraph wires extend to the Siberian frontier, but from Kiakta to Pekin and Tien-Tsin despatches are conveyed by couriers on horseback. By the new line immediate communication would be had with Europe and the New World Unfortunately the Chinese Government is at present opposed to the project.

New York, Aug. 19.—Gold 1854. Sterling Exchange dull at 110. Judge Plerrepont, the United States Attorney in New York, has stated publicly that the General

Government has received from Spain, in answer to overtures to that end by the United States, assurances of a purpose on the part of the Home Govern-ment to grant the independence of Cuba. We do not understand that this independence of Cuba means a separation from Spain, but an independence and freedom in its local affairs, such as Great Britain extends to her American provinces.

MEXICO. Advices from Mexico, to July 22d, state that an nsurrection had broken out among the Indians in Yucatan; that the volcanic eruption in Colima was growing worse; and that the Puebla Railroad will open in September. The Mexican Minister to the United States had arrived at Havana.

SOUTH-AMERICA. Advices from Ascension to June 17th, received by way of Rio, state that three member of the new Provisional Government of Paraguay have been elected by a popular vote.
