THE WESTERN AND ANNAPOLIS RAILWAY. - This line, says the Presbyterian Witness is 834 miles, 66 miles of which are in running order. The rails are all laid with the exception of tive miles. The principal ballasting is to be done between Windsor and Wolfville. The heaviest work is the construction of the bridges across the Avon, Half Way River, and the Gaspereaux River, all likewise between Windsor and Wollville. The Bridge across the Avon will be one of the finest as well as most substantial in the Dominion. Five of the eight piers are fully completed; the foundations of the three others are nearly laid. It will consist of eight spans of 160 feet each. The Gaspereaux bridge has two spans of 150 feet each. The Half Way River bridge, only one span of 150 feet. There will be 100 cars and 9 locomotives on the line. Six of the locomotives, constructed in Bristol, England are pronounced to be the best on the Continent. At present there are 1000 men employed; of these 140 are at work on the Avon bridge. There are 15 Stations and land provided for 20. The line will be opened for traffic from Bridgetown to to Wolfville, about 48 miles, by the middle of this month; and from Annapolis to Wolfville by the middle of August. The whole line will be in running order by the last of December.

ENGLISH AND FOREIGN. THE IRISH CHURCH BILL. - It will have been seen that the collision between the English House of Commons and the House of Lords, which it was thought that the original reception of the Irish Church bill by the latter would prevent, has actually come to pass through another method, that is, in consequence of the amendments added to the bill by the Lords. Their general effect was, not to disestablish the Episcopal Church in Ireland, but to endow concurrently all the other churches there. This is to multiply the burdens of Ireland, instead of removing one of the greatest. Such action changes the whole purport and character of Mr. Gladstone's bill, and his supporters in the House of Commons could do nothing else but reject the amendments, which they have done by handsome majorities. Consequently, it now remains to be seen whether the Lords will yield, or whether they will adhere, and thus make a direct issue with the Commons and with the great popular majority of England. It is possible that since the Government has accepted some of the minor amendments adopted by the Lords, that the latter may modify their action on the remainder, and thus an agreement may be gradually worked out. In the meantime popular agitation is on the increase throughout the kingdom, and will be likely soon to assume a formidable shape, if the Lords should continue obstinate. The protest, however, filed by Earl Derby and his Tory friehds, rather looks as if that party were preparing to relieve themselves from all responsibility for the final adoption of the measure, which is to be conceded under the pressure of necessity.

ROMAN CATHOLICISM IN THE DIOCESE OF WESTMINISTER.—Archbishop Manning has just issued "A Pastoral Letter to the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Westminister for Trinity Sunday." "The breathing of the Holy Ghost, the Spirit of Life," says the archbishop, "has sensibly gone forth over England. We feel it like the coming of spring. God has his purposes for us; and there are some even now in the midst of us who will perhaps see what a few years ago the most hopeful hardly dreamed."
