charges.

The Emperor referred to the approaching election of the Corps Legislatiff; he congratulated the members on the harmony which existed between the Throne, the Legislature and the people and declared that he favored full and free discussion when it did not touch the Constitution. That instrument was above all debate. He exaked the benefits which it had conferred upon the country. The Emperor concluded as follows: "All Governments are liable to error; fortune declines to smile on all enterprises; but the country knows no thought, no act of mine which has not been given to the glory of France. It knows that I first sought to create a vigorous control of the administration and then to enlarge the powers of deliberdive assemblies to prove that the true support of the Government is in the independence and patriotism of the great bodies of State. Soon the nation in the ns will mark the path which all must follow and will repeat its rejection of the Revolution and its desire to found the destines of France on the intimate union of Power and Liberty."

A timult occurred in Tortosa, Spain, on Wednesday, growing out of a quarrel between the Liberal and Carlist parties. It was suppressed by the authorities and the City is now quiet.

The Madrid journals urge the Government to use all means to strengthen the hands of Gen. Dulce in Havana, and demand that 10,000 additional troops be sent to Cuba to render the possession of that Island

secure.

Advices from Madrid state that Government authorities received a despatch from Dulce, Captain General of Cuba, asking for reinforcements. The General thinks he can suppress the insurrection there with 4,000 additional troops.

The elections for members of the Consequent Cortes have commenced. The Revolutionists made some attempts to create disturbance at the polling place, but they proved abortive. With these exceptions good order has been maintained.

The Riots occasioned by attempts to collect the Mill Tax" have been renewed recently in various parts of the kingdom. The country to-day, however, is tranquil. The military force has been used freely for the suppression of these disorders and 26 rioters have been killed and wounded.
