### Coffee.

Coffee is the seed of a small evergreen tree, indigenous to Southern Abyssinia and Liberia, occupying a narrow belt, probably across the continent of Africa. The seeds, if fresh, readily germinate ; and in a suitable climate the plant commences to bear in three years, and continues bearing during twenty years or more. There is one main crop during the year, but there are flowers and ripe fruit ever on the tree.

The ripe fruit resembles a cherry in size and color, but contains two seeds instead of one. The seeds are imbedded in a pulp, which, at a particular time, is edible. If allowed to remain on the tree the pulp dries up. It is asserted that the coffee is improved by allowing the pulp to remain on the seed till perfectly dry. The dry envelope is then removed by machinery, and the chaff fanned out.

The character of the seed is much affected by the climate and soil. Dry, hilly lands are said to produce the finest coffee. The grains are smaller, harder and more highly aromatic when roasted. In the beginning of the fifteenth century coffee was transplanted into Arabia; about a century later it began to be used in Eastern Europe. In 1651, it was in use in London. The culture of coffee soon spread over the whole intertropical world, and now it forms an important article of commerce. Brazil is the greatest producer of coffee. That BUFFALOES.-Received permr. "Linda," a supply of Buffalo Robes of good guity. known in the trade as Rio, is a Brazilian coffee. Of the 713,000,000 lbs. produced by the world, per annum, Brazil furnishes 400,000,000, or more than half of the whole. Java 140,000,000, Ceylon 40.000.000, St. Domingo 40.000,000, Cuba and Porto Rico 25,000,000, Venezuela 25,000,000, Sumatra 25,000,000, all others, including the Mocha, 18,000,000. The United States is the greatest consumer. We use in the United States nearly one third of all the coffee consumed in the world, using nearly seven times as much as Great Britain, with a population not very far from the same. Germany comes next. Russia, the largest and most populous, the least. Varieties of coffee are very great in number. The Mocha is the most highly esteemed. It is very doubtful whether any first quality of Mocha coffee reaches our market. It is picked over and sorted. The best retained, the inferior exported. The amount produced, too, is comparatively very small. Probably ten-pounds of coffee is sold as Mocha, that did not come from Arabia, to one that is the genuine Mocha. The Java is the next most highly esteemed. All coffees improve by age. The Eastern coffees will ripen, as it is called, in two or three years ; but the American coffees require a much longer time, ten to fifteen years. Some have supposed all are equally good, or may become so by age. That the coffee seed changes by exposure is evident. That it will, in its natural state, absorb volatile materials has been abundantly proved. By being stored with odorous materials, it will imbibe their odor. Cargoes have been ruined by proximity of other materials in the cargo. The constitution of coffee has been studied with the utmost care by the most eminent chemists. There is found in the coffee grains about 1 per cent of caffeine, 6 to 7 per cent. of sugar and 10 to 12 per cent. of fat. Caffeine is the distinguishing element of coffee. It is a nitrogenous material, and adapted to afford true nourishment to the system. What is a most singular fact is, that this material is found in those substances extensivly employed by mankind as daily beverages. Tea contains it. The cocoa or chocolate contains theobromine, an identical or closely related article. It is very singular that three-fourths of the homan family should have hit on the same material, existing in nature, in very different couditions, as their daily beverage. We certainly might infer its fitness to supply some important requirement of the human system. That it does do so has been abundantly proved by the most accurate experiments in the hands of the most expert philosophers. But it is not raw coffee that we use. It is roasted. It is in this condition that it becomes of interest to us. We have no hesitation in saying that one-half of the coffee is ruined by the process of roasting. It is the first and most imrtant step in making good coffee. The roasting should be conducted as much as possible in a close vessel, with as little exposure to the air as may be. It should be roasted to a light chesnut brown, not darker, or till the grain becomes brittle when cold. If the coffee is black, it is rained. The materials are decomposed, and nothing is left but charcoal and some empyreumatic oil. A little sugar and lard mixed with charcoal would make ist as good coffee, when roasted. The peculiar, ous aroma is produced by roasting, and is a

known to absorb as to produce spontancous combustion. Recently roasted and ground coffee is a good deodorizer, absorbing the offensive emanations and leaving its own aroma behind.

Much care is requisite in making coffee. As remarked above, the aroma is due to a volatile oil. produced during the roasting. If we place some roasted or ground coffee in a retort and distill it with water, receiving the distillate in a cold receiver, we obtain in the receiver all the delicious flavor of the coffee, and have in the retort what usually comes to our tables, a black, bitter sweet infusion, which may be disguised by sugar and cream to a state possible for deglatition. The aroma has gone. So it is in all boiling coffee. Coffee, to be perfect, should be made in a tight vessel, and not be boiled, if the whole of its peculiar richness is to be preserved.

The effect of coffee, as a beverage, is variously estimated by different individuals. This we should expect from the varying character of the material imbibed. But the physiological effects of coffee are not in doubt. It operates in two very distinct directions. First, by stimulating the nervous and vascular tissues. This is experienced by every one after taking a cup of good coffee. The system is invigorated and the sensibilities are more acute. Second, it retards the transformation of the muscular tissues into lower chenical compounds. This has been proved by Lehman, by direct experiment. By this operation the coffee acts as an equivalent for meat-producing fod, if it does not actually produce it. It saves the powers of the body, if it does not create them. It is like the oil on machinery, it is a preservatorof force, although without force itself.

Coffee, if ground, is liable t be adultcrated. The adulteration is usually sime root, as the chickory or dandelion, or even otatoes and beets. These adulterations are easily etected in various ways. If the powder is sifted in cold water, the coffee will sink to the bottom ad give no color; whereas the adulteration will st sink so readily, and will give a dark color, eve to cold water. If a concentrated solution be mae with hot water. the coffee will give no addittoal consistence to the solution, while the adultations will make it thicker and starchy. The solube matter in roasted coffee is about 20 per cent.; i the roasted roots it is greater. In American Groer.


