DEAR EDITOR:

While in Charlotte County I spent several days in Pennfield, assisting my esteemed brother, Rev. James Trimble, in holding a few extra services, with results quite cheering as he has probably informed your readers. The little church there is considerably revived.

Charlotte County is better supplied with Baptist pastors than I had supposed. Brother Trimble is looking after Pennfield and Mascareen, Brother Stewart, St. Back Bay, the Ledge, Baillie and Rolling

The last mentioned brother is occupying a field far larger than he can advantageously cultivate, and he would gladly relinquish a portion of it, could it be otherwise supplied. Rolling Dam would make an excellent centre for a Missionary Pastor, with Greenock, Dumbarton, Whittier Ridge and Tower Hill, as out stations, and it is important that these fields should be occucupied at an early date, by an energetic young man. A subsidy of \$100 would be required for the first year and rich harvests of souls might be gathered in.

Charlotte Co., as a result of the labors of Revs. S. Robinson, A. D. Thompson, James Walker and others of precious memory, and also other faithful men who are yet in the field, is largely Baptistic in in sentiment, but if we fail in our duty others will step in and take the heritage left us by the fathers. Denominational Statistics

No. 2.

In my first article the printer has misinterpreted the meaning of one sentence, besides making a few changes of less importance. I expressed an opinion that the plan already in operation is in a general way, as good as could be contrived, but a "not," has been inserted, making me say the reverse. The imperfections pointed out, relate, not to the main features of the plan, but to the manner in which it is worked out in detail.

Referring again to our last Year Book, we find that it contains a well arranged list of ordained minsters, with their residences, etc., but the number is not given and we are left to count the names for ourselves. Nowhere in the book is there meeting houses, and the value of church property,-perhaps because many churches fail to report these items to the Associa-

The contributions to our Foreign Mission Fund are fully reported, and exhibited in a manner which does credit to the Secretary. But of the sums contributed for read, and adopted, and the amount due. Acadia College we cannot say as much, for

> Among the interesting facts that are reported to the Associations, but not summarized for the whole body, are the following Number of deaths, number excluded, num ber restored, number dismissed, number received by letter, number of members re siding at a distance from their churches number of houses of worship, value of church property, statistics of Sunday Schools, etc. The sums of money raised by each church for various local and deno minational objects might be exhibited in tabular form in the Year Book, if they were properly reported to the Associations Sometimes no such tables are published by sociation Minutes. For instance, the Minutes of the Western New Brunswick As sociation for several years past have contained no statistical tables except in relation to membership, although many of the churches have reported as usual. This may be partly explained by the fact that in one or more of these years, no blank forms for letters were issued to the churches.

Now let us consider some of the improvements that might be made in the details of our plan of collecting denominational statistics.

- 1. In order to secure uniformity, and render it possible to make satisfactory summaries and averages, we should have the same blank forms for reports in use in all the Associations.
- 2. Special efforts should be made to obtain full reports from all the churches.
- 3. Some one officer or Committee should be charged with the duty of collecting the statistical returns from all the Associations and making them up in proper form for publication in the Year Book.
- 4. For this and other purposes, the Secretary of the Convention might be made a permanent officer, like the Secretaries of the College and Missionary Boards or else he might be elected for a term of about five years. He should receive some remuneration for his services. Probably the best way would be to entrust him with the publication of the Year Book, and allow him to sell it at a fixed price, say 20cts per copy, the Convention paying him for a sufficient number of copies, (a) nent preservation by the Convention itself United States.
